Work Session and
Monthly Meeting
August 10, 2014**

At a work session and regular monthly meeting of the Buckingham County Board of Supervisors held on Monday, August 10, 2014 in the Peter Francisco Auditorium of the Buckingham County Administration Complex, the following members were present: Danny R. Allen, Chairman; Joe N. Chambers, Jr., Vice-Chairman; I. Monroe Snoddy; John N. Staton; Cassandra Stish; E.A. "Bill" Talbert; and Donald E. Bryan. Also present were Rebecca S. Carter, County Administrator; Karl Carter, Asst. County Administrator; Rebecca S. Cobb, Zoning Administrator and E.M. Wright, Jr., County Attorney.

Re: Quorum

Chairman Allen certified there was a quorum. Seven of seven members present. The meeting could continue.

Re: Call to Order, Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance

Chairman Allen called the work session to order. Supervisor Chambers gave the invocation and the Pledge of Allegiance was said by all who were in attendance.

Re: Work Session regarding Hatton Ferry Repairs and Elimination of County Decals

Carter: We'll work on the Hatton Ferry first. I provided you last month with pictures of the Buckingham County side of the Hatton Ferry and also the Albermarle County side to let you see that the upkeep to the Buckingham County side is certainly in poor condition however, in order for Buckingham County to provide money to have repairs done to it, the Albermarle Historical Society has to approve. The gentleman to this date has not gotten back to me. He told me that he was going away on vacation and when he got back he would take it to the Board. I reached out to him again today. Mrs. Louis said they have had someone go down there and so some repairs that helped. A volunteer did some repairs that would help for maybe a year but really tonight we can't do anything because we don't have their approval. We have held the money from going to the Hatton Ferry. The check has actually been written to Historic Buckingham I believe and is being held until we see where we go with that. So hopefully we can get him to the next meeting or he will have gotten back to me by then. I believe I have provided you also with a quote she had gotten for the repairs of about \$10,875. Of course that money would go to Historic Buckingham for them to have repairs done if we do it. I guess as it stands, we don't really have to work on this tonight because we don't have their approval at this time to take care of it.

The next item is to work on the possible elimination of the county decal. I have provided you all with information on this. Do you all want to start with page 1 and go down through it? I would recommend that as we go down through it, anytime we need to stop and ask a question because I'm asking for your input too. This is just information that I have gotten from other counties and to provide you as best I can with the advantages and disadvantages of the elimination of the county decal.

What we've come up with so far as the advantages to the taxpayer:

Consideration of Elimination of County Decal

Advantages for the Taxpayer:

- Will not have to scrape and stick county decals.
- Will not have to come to the Treasurer's Office to purchase or purchase through the mail a county decal.

We do have some that would send the money in the mail and the Treasurer's office would mail them the decal.

Disadvantages for the Taxpayer

- The cost of the decal may need to be billed as part of the personal property tax and called a license fee. Most counties have had to increase the administration fee and license fee due to making up for the loss money and for the cost to DMV for administration of the DMV Stop if a taxpayer has delinquent personal property. Presently the decal fee is due by April 15th of each year, if this change occurs the fees will be due December 5th of each year.

This is how most counties have done this. So that would eliminate the April 15th county deadline.

- Most Counties that have eliminated the county decal have increased the license fee and added it to the personal property tax bill.
- Counties have said they had to increase the fee to offset the additional associated cost.

• Albemarle:

- Motor vehicles, trucks
- 4,000 lbs. and less \$38.50
- 4,001 and greater 43.50
- Motorcycles 26.50
- Trailers 1,500 lbs. and less 19.50
- 1,501 and greater 30.00

- Fluvanna
- \$18.00 for motorcycles
- \$33.00 for everything else
- Nelson County \$38.75 decal fee

- Cumberland
- Cars, trucks and buses \$23.00
- Motorcycles 18.00
- Trucks over 10,000 gross
- Weight 39.00

Their fees were \$25.

They did not increase their fee when they eliminated the decal. They are the only county we've talked to that did not increase their fee.

Buckingham County Present Fees

- Appomattox County is \$25.00 and going to \$35.00 in December, 2015. (An Appomattox Supervisor advised Supervisor Talbert and I that they also increased the personal property tax to \$5.05 per \$100.00 value for one year and then will take that tax back to \$4.60 after one year. He also advised that they are considering implementing a \$40.00 fee instead of the \$20.00 DMV fee) I am waiting on confirmation on this to make sure I have the numbers and dates correct)
- Prince Edward County License Fee went from \$25.00 to \$35.00 a year after eliminating the county decal. They also have different fees for different types ranging from \$18.00 for trailers to \$45.00 for trucks over 7500 lbs.

- Automobiles: \$25.00
- Truck, Trailers, Etc. \$25.00
- Motorcycle: \$20.00
- Towed Boat and Camper Trailer:
- 1,000- 1,500 lbs.: \$6.50
- 1,501-4,000 lbs.: \$18.50
- \$50.00 for each and every trailer or semi-trailer over 4,001 lbs. that is not designated and used for the Transportation of passengers, and not exempt from taxation. This fee is valid for the life span of the trailer or until a change of ownership occurs.

Talbert: Can I make a comment on this one? I talked to one of the constitutional officers and they kind of grinned and said they made money on it so I thought they had increased

theirs but they hadn't.

Carter: They haven't increased it yet. The County administrator said they are going to \$35 in December. What they did do was increase their personal property tax from \$4.60 to \$5.05 for a year. It's that first year that most likely until things level off that you are going to lose money. Also she confirmed that instead of a \$20 DMV fee they are considering raising it to \$40 because so many times you will lose your money because the treasurer will have to pay that \$20 for every vehicle that she puts that stop on and if those people don't come in and pay their taxes, we lose that \$20. So in some ways, other people are going to have to pay for the delinquency of others to implement this. The Appomattox County Administrator did say that they are working on the percentage of the values right now until they see how this works out so they are kind of unsure right now of how they are going to make up their lost money. That is what they've done so far is raise their personal property from \$4.60 to \$5.05 this year and then look at what they need to do.

Talbert: Can I make another statement? Every two years I've traded vehicles. I can't do it no more. I can't stand \$40,000 retired, make payments on it and go down here to the Commissioner of the Revenue or Treasurer and pay \$100 month taxes on it because it would be \$1700 so as far as I'm concerned, I'll never buy another...I can't. I enjoy buying new vehicles because of the mileage I put on them but now I'm not in the auction business I don't put as many on them but I think it's ridiculous. They did right. John was on here. Joe was on here and I think Monroe, when they moved...they took it to \$4.05 but you realize how much vehicles were then. Not to exceed \$9,000 and now they are \$40,000. They did the right thing, but over the years including myself when I came on the board 12 years ago, we didn't try to take that tax down a little bit to help people so they could afford a new vehicle. I can't afford them no more. Helen's got one but she's got more money than I have. We have to because Allen is so far away, we have to have something we can depend on. My pickup, I can't. Gone. It's got 160,000 so anyway, thank you.

Carter: Prince Edward saw in the first year they too were losing money.

Allen: Let me ask you a question, so we are still adding the \$25 back as a fee and still lost money because of what?

Carter: As we get down through here I will show you but mostly collection fees with DMV.

Cost to the County for Decals

- The localities that still have decals are:
- Cities of Alexandria, Colonial Heights, Fairfax, Falls Church, Galax, Manassas Park, Petersburg, Salem. Counties of Scott, Russell, Tazewell, Giles, Pulaski, Grayson, Craig, Alleghany, Rockbridge, Buckingham, Mecklenburg, Brunswick, Nottoway, Amelia, New Kent, Matthews, Caroline, Fauquier, Loudoun, Clarke, Warren, Arlington and Henry.
- The cost to purchase the decals and mail out the county decal notices is approximately 64 cents per decal. About 14,460 decals are sold which calculates a total cost of \$9,254.00.
- The County pays the Town of Dillwyn \$4,000.00 to sell county decals to town residents, this would be eliminated.
- Total Cost \$13,254.00

Additional Fees

- Total Cost to the County: \$13,254.00
- Average Revenue Received from the
- Revenue from the Sale of decals: Average of \$300,000.00. FY2015 is \$330,000.00
- For every stop the Treasurer issues to DMV, DMV will charge a \$20.00 fee. The county will have to pay that fee to DMV and the Treasurer will collect that fee from the taxpayer when they pay their delinquent taxes. If they do not pay the delinquent taxes, the County is still responsible for the \$20.00 per vehicle stop to DMV. The Treasurer has advised that she will most likely request the county to attached an additional fee to cover the cost of the administrative transactions with DMV.

Carter: Mr. Chairman, this is where we get to where we are going to have some additional fees. If you eliminate the county decals, on December 5th, the treasurer's office is to turn into DMV and put a stop on Virginia license tags being sold to anyone not having paid their personal property tax. As we said before DMV charges a \$20 fee that has to be paid. We don't wait until someone comes in and pays. The county has to pay that fee to DMV. The treasurer will collect that fee from the taxpayer when and if they pay their delinquent taxes. If they do not pay the delinquent taxes, the county is still responsible for the \$20 per vehicle stop to DMV. The Treasurer advised that she will most likely request the county to attach an additional fee to cover the cost of the administrative transactions with DMV. That's what Appomattox is looking at. DMV has a specific procedure and information has to be put in the computer and sent over to DMV so there is that administrative cost. Now if you left it at that \$20, the person has to come in and pay their taxes and the treasurer would collect that \$20 at that time.

Staton: I have a question right there, Mr. Chairman. When you were going through that, you said personal property tax. Is it personal property tax or just the license tax, license fee?

Carter: They would have to pay it all.

Staton: Because it's on the personal property ticket.

Carter: Personal property tax plus whatever license fee the county puts on it that would...some in other larger counties have actually increase their personal property. I don't know of a fair way to do that. It may be something you could do at a later date and take that fee off but what Bill was saying, our personal property rate is \$4.05 and I don't think we would want to increase that.

Stish: I have a question, would the license fee accrue penalties and interest as part of the fold. Would that be a policy position for us?

Christian: That would be once the ordinance was written. Once that is all changed, you all would decide. I do know this, right now if you don't buy a decal one year and then come in the next, I can only get the current decal. These license fees carry for up to five years like personal property.

Stish: So they would be accruing. So if I come in this year I would have to make the other ones all current.

Talbert: I have a question that I'm not sure about and we might have to ask the county attorney, do we have to have a county sticker period. In other words I have seven deeds for property. I have no sticker or nothing saying...

Carter: You don't have to have a county decal...

Talbert: We don't have to have them period?

Carter: If the county eliminates them, you don't have to have a decal.

Talbert: We don't have to go through the state or nothing? Thank you. It would be up to her and the commissioner of revenue to see that the taxes are collected and paid.

Carter: Yes.

Talbert: Thank you. According to the law, you've answered my question.

Carter: Any other questions on that part.

- Based on the fact that approximately 16% pay taxes after the December deadline, the cost to do set off debt on those approximate 2300 vehicles, the amount paid to DMV could be as much as \$46,000.00 if all of these taxpayers receive DMV stops placed on them.

If they do not for some reason renew that vehicle with DMV, the County will lose the money plus the \$20.00 STOP fee.

This was the last year.

Examples

- Current :
- Personal Property is due December 5th of each Year.
- About 16% of taxpayers choose to pay the penalty and interest and wait to pay their taxes by April 15th (current deadline for county decals) when they get their state and federal income tax returns.

- From March 1, 2015 to April 29, 2015 the Treasurer collected **\$430,237.01** in delinquent personal property Tax. The Treasurer also collected **\$44,450.45** in Penalty and **\$20,577.18** in interest.
- **Total \$495,264.64**
- This represents about 16% of the taxpayers paying PP Tax by April instead of December deadline.

Carter: To be honest with you. We've talked to a lot of these people and they don't have it or they chose to use it for Christmas and wait until they get their income taxes. It's something that we all kind of gotten used to because the county collects better penalty and interest than we do on our money that's invested. So that's again, where we might lose some money.

These people paid these taxes and penalty and interest when they get their decal. That is when the line is out there.

County Advantages and Disadvantages

- Those that pay their taxes on time will see the change of the decal fee being due December 5 instead of April 15, and an increased cost to make up for the administration of the DMV Stop Program.
- Will more strive to pay on time? We would hope so; but we must face the reality that some cannot pay it until they receive their tax refunds. In many cases some choose to use their money for Christmas and pay taxes late or wait until they receive their federal and state tax refunds. This appears to be a reality that has been a trend for some taxpayers that the County has been understanding with and along with this choice they choose to pay the penalty and interest.

- Advantages: The County may realize more personal property taxes paid on time.
- The April citizen traffic in the Treasurers Office will be much less if citizens do not have obtain a county decal.

Because it would have to be paid when they pay their taxes. The increased cost if you go from \$25 to \$35 or if you have to make up for the DMV stop program.

Chambers: Back up to page 13 again. I don't quite understand. You said there is 23 vehicles and the amount paid to DMV would be \$46,000?

Staton: 2300.

Chambers: Oh, 2300. Ok. I meant 2300 vehicles, the amount would be \$46,000 paid to DMV?

Carter: We pay \$20 for all 2300. That's \$46,000.

Staton: Go forward and give us a total on that. The next one.

Stish: About \$65,000.

Carter: \$65,000 in penalty and interest from March 1st to April 15th. If we had this procedure in place.

Talbert: I'm saying you don't have to go with DMV.

Carter: The treasurer would have had about 2300 vehicles to turn into DMV and it would be \$20 for each one to DMV to put a stop on them getting their state license. So if that person that still had to wait until April to pay their taxes, their state license was due in December, January, February or March, that person would have to come to the treasurer's office, pay all their taxes, penalty and interest, \$20 fee or whatever fee the county puts on, it would have to be at least \$20, before they can get their state tags.

- Disadvantages: The Treasurer has commented that it will create more work for the Treasurers office to collect past due accounts and more costly to collect past due accounts. The information that has to go DMV for the "stops" will have to be compiled by the Treasurer's Office. When the taxpayer comes in to pay the Treasurer's office will have to follow DMV's procedure to disable the "stop" with DMV.
- The Treasurer's Office will have to compile the information to submit to the Department of Motor Vehicles when a taxpayer becomes delinquent.
- The taxpayer may have a state license renewal fee due on November 30th, county taxes due December 5th. In this case the taxpayer would have a full year before a stop would be implemented by DMV. Therefore the County may not have the county decal collection tool and the taxes may remain unpaid for a year.

Carter: It wouldn't be like they would come in today and pay everything and be able to go back to DMV say in the morning and get their tags. It would be a procedure she would have to go through. That may create some disadvantages.

Bryan: Instead of...what you are trying to say is you are going to cut down on the April traffic but you are going to increase the December traffic. Realistically, those that procrastinate until April 15th to get their sticker, the very last day...but then they have to pay personal property by December 5th which is also Christmas time. Also, when the second half of realty taxes are due.

Stish: I think we are talking about the 16% are probably the 16% that need an advocate here. I know it's a hassle. True. Putting on a sticker is a pain, scraping it off the window is a pain. I think I still have my other one on there.

Carter: That's not counting the ones that don't pay it at all.

Stish: Coming down here and making a special trip is a hassle. Whatever. But those 16% of our constituents, those are the ones that are struggling to survive. Those are the ones on all those papers we see that says Buckingham County has got an average unemployment rate of 16,900 and some a year. I think they need a break. I think if we can float them a little and they pay a little and we float them and they can have a couple things for Christmas and we are not hitting them in December. I think we can flex on that. Also, we are adding a layer...I hate beurocracy. My God in Heaven, we are laying a layer of beurocracy here that's insane. DMV stops, got to report back to DMV, got to get DMV to say go and then they can go get their thing. That's way more of a hassle then coming down here to get a dag on decal. For goodness sake. Sorry.

Talbert: We DO NOT HAVE TO GO WITH DMV. Right. Why do we keep talking about DMV? Do away with the county sticker. If 4 members of this board say do away with the sticker and then it's up to somebody else to collect the taxes. Just like the real estate. How much is owed in Real Estate? \$300,000 and some.

Bryan: What tool are you going to use, Mr. Talbert?

Talbert: The same as you do real estate.

Bryan: I don't have to pay my personal property tax right now.

Carter: We have more delinquent real estate than we do personal property.

Bryan: I don't have to pay personal property tax right now. So DMV is a tool used to get that paid. I can go 5 years...

Christian: Right now, personal property tax is collectible for 5 years. Real estate is 20.

Bryan: Ok, so I cannot pay my personal property for 5 years, what are you going to do?

Christian: There are several things I can do. I already do DMV stops, we do bank liens, and we do garnishments.

Chambers: That will take care of it.

Christian: There is a collection tool that is fairly easy but people have learned how to skirt around it.

Bryan: There is a way to beat every system.

Carter: In talking about DMV, you cannot tell the treasurer she cannot do the DMV stop. She has....

Talbert: I'm not saying that, I'm just simply saying that we do not have to go through DMV. We do away with the sticker. Period.

Carter: When we get through this, you will see that she does do them. She waits until after April to give those people a chance. Maybe we have too much heart. I don't know.

Talbert: Who gives her the authority to do that? I don't think this board has. In other words, taxes are due when they are due. If they can't pay them, tough. Ain't nobody been no poorer in this county than I have and I've always paid my taxes. I'm on a retired income and I've already lost \$40,000 to the federal government. I was supposed to get \$960 social security and I get \$581. Tell me how many people have lost that much money in 14 years. I've always paid my taxes. I don't buy this thing that people can't pay. They can go to town and buy lottery tickets and beer they can't buy a county sticker. I'm not going to buy that excuse. Period.

Presently

- If a taxpayer owes taxes on ANY vehicles they cannot receive a county decal for ANY vehicles until all delinquent taxes are paid.
- With DMV Stops there are many avenues that will be considered unenforceable stops.

Unenforceable Stops

- The Treasurer advised that the following are some of the most common reasons VRW Stops do not work on all individuals:

Some of those, some of the most common would be the stops do not work on all individuals.

- A stop cannot be placed on a taxpayer that is under bankruptcy protection
- Some Mobile Homes Tax cannot be linked with a specific taxpayer due to dummy social security numbers
- No stop can be place on permanent plates
- Our system uses social security numbers to identify taxpayers. Stops are attached at DMV using title numbers. The stop automatically attaches to other vehicles owned by the taxpayer, but becomes unenforceable if the taxpayer sells or does not renew plates for the matching title number (ex, re-title to a family member)

If we go back to bankruptcy, where DMV can't collect on them, but if we have a county decal, they will mostly come in to get that decal. So they are not stopped without it.

We do have some with permanent plates.

This will give you a good idea of how difficult it is for the treasurer to collect everybody's taxes. They have ways of skirting around them and I don't want to reveal too many of them to give anybody ideas but there are ways.

They could title it to another family member or whatever. If they buy a new vehicle, DMV doesn't care if they've paid their taxes either.

- Taxpayers can renew for three years and our stop does not cause problems for them until it is time to renew
- Stops cannot be placed on a vehicle that has been registered to another state
- Death
- Vehicles that have been converted to farm use are not longer required to register with the state.
- The Treasurer advised that currently DMV stops are done after April 15th decal deadline. She begins with those taxpayers who owe the most and then works down. The collection process is continual and requires much time and effort. The Treasurer advised that her office works diligently to maintain a good collection rate. She advised that if decals are eliminated, she will have no choice but to begin using all collection methods such as VRW STOPS, Debt Set-off, garnishments, bank liens, distress warrants, etc. as soon as the tax becomes delinquent. There are fees associated with all of these collection methods that would be paid by the county.

She doesn't submit everyone because of the cost. There is no way to get the cost back from the taxpayer at the present time. She will have to start that process right away instead of like she does now, tries to work with people. I might add, we say that 16% paid them in April, but there are those...that's not counting the ones that didn't pay them at all. That 16% do pay their taxes, they just take a while longer. We have some that don't and leave the county and it's very hard to find them.

- The county may realize a fluctuation of personal property collections for the first year if the requirement for taxes to be paid before a county decal can be obtained is not in place.
- Unfortunately we do not know if that fluctuation will be up or down.
- The change may result in a revenue flow to the county throughout the year vs a large amount collected in April. Again that is not known. I believe this is the reason that some counties have had to continue to raise the fees after elimination of the decal.

Carter: I think that's one reason the first year, Prince Edward tried to stay with the \$25 and the next year they had to go to \$35. The first year probably would be a rude awakening for a lot of people. So we don't know how our revenue stream would be.

Again, that is not known. I believe that is why some counties had to continue to raise the fee after the elimination of decals.

Presently

- The Treasurer already has the authority and does use that authority to issue DMV "stops" for delinquent Personal Property taxes. However she generally does not issue the stops until after the end of April because the county decal is a good collection tool, not only for the tax but for penalty and interest collection.
- A county decal is due by April 15th at a cost of \$25.00 for each decal.
- Personal Property Tax on all vehicles must be current before any decal can be issued.
- April is a large personal property tax collection month due to several factors.

She doesn't do it until after April.

Waste Site Identification

- Between the period of March 1, 2015 and April 29, 2015 the Treasurer's Office collected \$430,237.01 in delinquent personal property taxes. \$65,027.00 penalty and interest was also collected.
- This represents that about 16% of the taxpayers paid PP Tax by April instead of the December deadline.
- Currently the County Decal also serves as a permit for county citizens to use the county waste sites. This helps to identify those that attempt to put "out of county" waste at our sites and those that have not paid their personal property tax. In some cases when a taxpayer goes into a site and does not have a decal, they will come to the Treasurer's office, pay the taxes and purchase a decal so they can legally use the sites.
- If the decal is eliminated, another means of identification must be found.

Carter: We don't encourage our monitors to tell them to do that. If they realize they can't dump because they don't have the decal a lot of times, not all the time, that's what they do. If we eliminate the decals, we will have to find another means...

Talbert: Here it is right here. I already had them made up.

Bryan: it's still a sticker. I still have to scrape.

Carter: They are still going to know its Buckingham County.

Talbert: He printed Buckingham on it but wasn't supposed to. It was supposed to be gold and green colors for Buckingham. Put your tax number on it and that's it.

Bryan: But they still have to get a sticker.

Talbert: It's permanent from now on.

Bryan: Then how do we know that I'm paying my solid waste fee.

Stish: I have one question I'd like to know. What is the purpose of the decal? We hear it's also this, and also this and also this. What was its purpose originally?

Staton: To raise taxes.

Stish: Is that it? Is that its purpose originally?

Carter: All the counties did it and the state allows you to do it but you can't have the fee higher than the state tags.

Christian: They were done as another form of tax but they were also a proof of payment of tax. In most localities, from what I understand, had a similar system as ours and was used as a dump sticker.

Stish: So basically it was imposed as another state approved, regulated means of tax collection for localities and we I guess by looking at the budget and looking at the numbers coming in from the decals and the numbers going out to solid waste they seemed to drive and it sort of became a permitting thing.

Carter: At one time it did.

Stish: They have become connected. They've become connected rather tightly in a regulatory and fiscal process.

Carter: The county decal was implemented long, long, long time before any of us were here.

Talbert: As a matter of fact, they used to have them on house trailers.

Stish: They still do.

Talbert: It got to be illegal to have them so they had to take them off.

Staton: It used to be a metal strip about an inch wide and you had to bolt it on to the top of your license plate. So scraping it off with a razor blade is a piece of cake.

Stish: I just wanted to find out the history. It's funny. We are sitting here trying to figure out if we should eliminate something or keep something and we have never really talked about what is its actual purpose. It's been used as this or that over the years. But it was originally brought up for something in particular so if its revenue generation and we are talking about eliminating it, we'd better make sure to figure out a way to remain revenue neutral which I have yet to here.

What I keep hearing is that most likely we will have no incentive to drive people in here to pay those taxes on a timely basis. They could eventually go to some of these extremes you are talking about, Christy. It seems that if folks are going that far, they are likely going to keep on trucking.

Carter: She said real estate is collectible for 20 years. Real estate is not going to go anywhere. Vehicles get crashed, sold, transferred and they leave the county and are only collectible for 5 years. So you can...if you are not careful, you can lose a lot of money. We've heard people say, oh, I've got to get my decal so I've got to pay my taxes. We need a way to assure that we will still get that money.

Bryan: I guess currently the way...I guess the way the decal is currently...you say the dump sticker, and if they get pulled for any violation by law enforcement, if they don't have a decal they can be written for that as well.

Carter: They can now, yes. If we eliminate it that would be something they wouldn't be in violation of.

Talbert: At the same time, you are taking up the time of our law enforcement with all the crime in Buckingham and all the drugs in Buckingham and go out here and catch somebody that hadn't paid or doesn't have a \$25 sticker.

Stish: It's a secondary offense.

Talbert: Well...

Bryan: It's a secondary offense but did you ever ask them why they do those traffic stops. I mean the state police did them. I got stopped on 15 and there was a county cop to the side but they were state troopers looking for license and registration.

Talbert: Well, they can give you a ticket for not having a county tag.

Carter: Yes they can if they stop you.

Bryan: They are not creating traffic stops just to see if you have a county decal. That's not what they are doing traffic stops for.

Talbert: But when the county does it, that's what they are looking for, is to see who's got a county sticker.

Staton: Most of the time they are looking for DUI's.

Stish: That's right. They are looking for DUI's. Most definitely.

Bryan: That and license.

Talbert: We don't have our sheriff here. He could straighten that out.

Stish: Seat belt violations and a couple other things. There are a lot of safety issues they are looking for. This is another layer on there. One more little check box on that warrant. If you've been particularly bad.

- A possible solution would be to add an additional cost to the personal property tax for the issuance of a solid waste permit. If the taxpayer does not pay the tax they do not get a solid waste permit. The taxpayer could choose to place the permit in their vehicle or affix it on their vehicle. This is just an idea and the solid waste committee is interested in hearing any ideas from the full board.

- There are advantages and disadvantages.

- I would like to ask the full board to schedule a work session to discuss the advantages and disadvantages before you schedule a public hearing on this matter. The Treasurer should be included in this work session also.

Talbert: Another thing, and I would kindly ask our paper man not to print this. I went down there Thursday to dump some trash. I could have put an atomic bomb in that thing because the man didn't even know I was there. He had his head down, I've never said anything about an employee. You know that.

Carter: No, but I sure wish you had reported that.

Talbert: Don't worry. I only have four more months but I'm going to every one of them and find out because Joe and I hired the biggest portion of them. But the point I'm getting at. It's the biggest joke because at 10:30 they leave there and don't come back to 2:00. Anybody can dump what they want to dump. If you are going to do it, hire people and pay them not minimum wage, pay them and let them stay there. It's not the only one in Buckingham County that doesn't get out of that house and meet the people. I've gone to Prince Edward. I've gone to Appomattox. I've gone to Nelson. They always come and meet. I don't have a sticker for them but I'm working auctions. I did go to Appomattox and he told me if David Austin hadn't been with you, you wouldn't have dumped it up here. He knew me. But he knew I lived in Buckingham. You have got to have people that is going to do their job. Just like you do your job and do a good job at it. If you are going to have a waste management program and you are going to use county stickers to justify that kind of thing, get people that can do the job. That's all. I hope you don't write anything on that. I can't tell you what to write and not write. But I appreciate it. We've got good employees. Somebody might take this wrong.

Stish: Mr. Talbert brings up the exact point I was trying to illustrate though. Decals were initiated for tax generation. They bring in \$330,000 a year. Ok. They have been applied to monitoring the waste stations. I think we may need to decouple these things. If it turns out that the decals remain the best way to police the waste system, fine. But let's decouple the subject. If we need to find a better way to manage the waste sites, fine. Let's do that. Let's do that completely separate from the decals. I don't want to bring up decals ever again when talking about waste management unless somebody says, the only way we can do it is if we check those decals and we are all in agreement. But I think they are completely different subjects. We need to decouple them. If we can do that and figure out how to make up \$330,000 a year and people come in here and pay their taxes on time and give them a nice lenient way to do so without penalizing them heavily or putting them through a bureaucratic circus with DMV, great. If we can't then I think we need to push this off until another day because we are not ready to make a decision on this. These are two big subjects.

Carter: Right now, the decal is bringing in the revenue but its dual purpose. I see what you are saying too to separate it. One possible solution as I said, and of course this is just one possibility, is to add another cost to the personal property tax also as an addition of a solid waste permit. A lot like what you have there. Maybe, since your concern was putting Buckingham County on the county decal, we don't have to put Buckingham County on there. We can put something else on there.

Talbert: That's an unsafe thing. I don't know why he printed...you know who printed these. Steve. Didn't charge anything either. I told him I didn't want Buckingham on it. I said you have a tax number right. For personal property. Madam Treasurer.

Staton: You have a decal number.

Christian: Bill number, account number?

Talbert: Whatever number you send to me.

Christian: Everyone has an account number.

Talbert: Alright, put that account number on there and if anybody's got a question they can call and take care of it.

Stish: It's possible we can do something simple like a bar code scanner thing and bar code. Go by and a little reader reads it. There's a lot of little digital...there is a ton of technology out there that can take care of this problem.

Carter: We've looked into some of that and it is very expensive.

Stish: They are expensive.

Allen: It doesn't have your address on it. It's not like somebody is going to know you live at 1219. No. It's Buckingham County. It's a great big county. If you can look at that sticker and tell where I live, more power to you.

Talbert: I took that lady serious in Richmond, somebody approached her and said I know where you live. You live in Buckingham. He could have followed her home. This day and time you don't know.

Staton: He could have followed her home if he didn't make the statement.

Bryan: That's right. That's like somebody saying I'm from Virginia. With my Virginia tags and that puts me at risk.

Chambers: That's a different thing.

Bryan: Buckingham County is a huge county, Joe. Think about it.

Chambers: You can't compare Buckingham to Virginia. Look at how many counties are in Virginia.

Bryan: But Buckingham is huge.

Chambers: Buckingham is one county.

Bryan: There are parts to this county I have never been in.

Chambers: That's true but I'm saying...

Stish: Instead of doing away with decals, we can just take Buckingham off of them.

Bryan: Is there a way to take the county off the decal?

Christian: I'm getting ready to order decals for 2015 or not, and I need to know your wishes.

Bryan: I mean if there is a way to take Buckingham County off the decal, then that satisfies that lady that came up here and complained and said I'm from Buckingham County. If I have a generic decal that verifies that I paid my personal property tax, it's all...

Carter: You can have a code. You can color code it.

Bryan: Well currently they are color coded anyway.

Stish: So this comes back around to the whole idea of how do we streamline the process to do what we are trying to do? Mr. Talbert brought in an example of a different kind of sticker that

might be utilized for the waste management system, so instead of coming in and getting their decal which is still a revenue but now the decal has on it a barcode. The barcode is directly tied to this account. We are going to have to pay for a system at the point sites that reads the barcode. When a person comes in there and hits that tag, we are going to know who is there, what time they came in, it's all time stamped. It's awesome. They work great.

Carter: It's also very expensive.

Stish: Very expensive. Ok. But look at the life of the system and decide if...

Bryan: But if you are going to do that, Cassie, then...

Stish: Do a cost analysis of it. Over 30 years, do you save money or lose money. Running a county is a long term proposition. It's not an annual basis thing.

Bryan: But if you are going to force me to get a dump sticker, then you are going to have to start closing the unmanned sites. Because then you are forcing me to buy a sticker when I can go next to Bill's house right there, what's that road, Bill?

Talbert: 640 is what I'm on.

Bryan: That unmanned site?

Talbert: 638.

Bryan: Yeah, on 638 and I can dump my trash there all day long. Or I can go by the chipping mill.

Carter: The solid waste committee is Donnie and John. They are asking for your input.

Bryan: What do we do?

Stish: They are going to have to be separated. You can't solve both with the same policy. You just can't do it.

Bryan: Can we do a solid waste fee and then again there begs the question, Karl buys his sticker and I don't.

Carter: We pay about \$180,000 a year to the monitors. The question is would we be getting \$180,000 worth of outside trash? We don't know the answer to that question. But you are exactly right, between the time that no one is there, it's when it seems they fill up. People know when to come in.

Talbert: At the same time, I'm going to speak on behalf of the Commonwealth Attorney. There is no way with the docket that he's got that he can prosecute, and that's his job to prosecute anyone that's breaking the law, regardless of all the codes we got. He can't do it. He's loaded down. The sheriff is loaded down. So you might as well forget about the whole thing of charging anybody or fining anybody because it's not going to work.

Stish: What about E-ticketing? So, this is something that happens all the time, you go through a red light and you get a ticket in the mail. There is no police officer involved. You were on camera. You drove through the thing. Right. So guess what, we don't have to have monitors at the sites anymore. That \$180,000 can go to some good technology. Maybe one person that goes around and visits them. But people from Buckingham will have a little code on their thing and it pings, we are here and we're good. Someone else comes in and dumps their trash, then guess what, they get a picture of their license plate and a picture of them dumping their trash and they get a nice bill from Buckingham County saying guess what, you owe us \$50 for dumping your trash.

Carter: That technology we've looked at is much more expensive than the monitors.

Stish: \$180,000 is only one year. How long would a system like this last? In three years, you've paid for it.

Carter: How many sites do we have?

Stish: I'm just trying to think...think of this system holistically here guys. It's like...

Chambers: I see what you are saying. What I'd like to see is to rotate the hours. I was talking to Bobby a few minutes ago before the meeting started, they know what time the monitors are there. If they are there from 7:00 to 10:00, change it from 10:00 to 11:00. Rotate the hours. That will stop a lot of it. They won't know what time they will be there.

Staton: In the morning they come out of Scottsville up 20 like ants.

Bryan: I need to ask the question of trying to do a study to find out the times it's used the most. Let's say it's not used from 11 to 1 when that monitor goes on their lunch break or whatever. Close the gate. If there is not the usage...look at what the other counties are doing. Cumberland closes the site on 45 on Sunday. Appomattox closes theirs. They go to manned sites. It's going to cause an inconvenience. I understand that. You know, but, Bill, you probably remember when there was a dumpsite on every corner. Then when they said they were going to start consolidating them, people were saying oh, my God, people are going to throw trash on the ground. Those that are going to throw trash on the ground are going to do it anyway. I don't care if you put a dumpster in their front yard.

Chambers: I think Mr. Staton will agree with me, that one on 655 when they close it comes to 657. I've seen Albermarle people over there. I've called John to tell him people were coming over there.

Staton: Yep, they come out of Nelson down 602.

Snoddy: As long as you've got the ones open, you've got problems. I have been to the one in Arvonnia, when the people are gone and you go there, they are not coming in there, they keep on up to Gold Hill.

Stish: I like this idea of studying when it's used the most. I think that is a good idea. Closing when they are not needed is a good idea. Great. We can consolidate them.

Carter: We'd have to have a consecutive schedule because people are not going to want to drive all the way there and it's closed. The solid waste committee could work with Lyn and work on that.

Stish: It's going to be a change and could be construed as an inconvenience but if you can compare it to having the privilege of having the trash guy come pick up the trash at my curb in Charlottesville for \$50 a month and if you don't have the trash out there at 5:00 in the morning on Tuesday, you are keeping it in your garage for a week because there is nowhere to take it. So at least we have a lot more in the way of options even if we do have to impose a few rules that will benefit everybody. These are two big subjects.

- The Board should meet to consider solutions to the disadvantages if you want to proceed with the possible elimination of the county decal. I would like to hear your input and ideas regarding this matter. I think it will be important for the public hearing presentation to have all of the advantages and disadvantages explained, along with your solutions to the disadvantages so the public will know what changes may take place.
- A resident has expressed concern to the Board that a county decal listing the name of the county that a person resides is dangerous because a person's county of residence can be known by the decal. A possible solution to this concern may be to not use the county name but to use an alternative identification on the decal.

Carter: That pretty much concludes what I have on the decals.

Staton: You have a couple more pages.

Carter: That is just what we just talked about. Some possible solid waste solutions. So we are interested and we've heard some of your ideas, in order to eliminate the county decal you will

have to go through the public hearing process for the Motor Vehicle Tax Ordinance. There will have to be some work done on that also. If you want to implement the License Tax Ordinance.

Chambers: I think we need more time to study this thing. There is a lot of information here that I didn't realize.

Stish: I'm with you, Mr. Chambers. I don't think I could move forward with a public hearing process. We don't have a solution for that \$330,000.

Bryan: In the interim though, I guess Mr. Talbert's main concern is having Buckingham County on the sticker and like Mrs. Christian said she's getting ready to order the stickers. Do you need a vote from us to say yes we want to take the name Buckingham County off the sticker?

Christian: I think I can do it as long as you are in agreement. A vote will be fine. I'd like to know.

Carter: I'd like a vote.

Stish: I make a motion that we design a sticker that does not disclose Buckingham County in an obvious way. A way that is not easily reproduced.

Chambers: Second.

Allen: There's a motion made and a second.

Bryan: What's the motion again?

Stish: A motion to remove anything identifying Buckingham County from the stickers and design it in such a way that they are not easily reproducible.

Allen: Any discussion?

Bryan: Mrs. Christian, is that good with you?

Christian: That's good. The only thing is, anything identifiable as Buckingham County...

Stish: Nothing like the county outline or...

Christian: They usually have the photo of the courthouse which will make it identifiable but I can remove the words Buckingham County easily.

Stish: The Courthouse is ok.

Allen: So we are going to remove Buckingham County but leave the courthouse. Everybody in agreement. Alright, let's vote. 7 yes to remove Buckingham County off the county stickers.

Supervisor Stish moved, Supervisor Chambers seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to redesign the County decal to not have Buckingham County on them and in such a way they cannot be easily reproducible.

Chambers: It's too late to put this on referendum in November ain't it? About the county sticker.

Bryan: In order for us to do that we have to have a solution. We have to do like you said...

Carter: If it goes on referendum, do you want to do away with the county decals, probably 99% of the people will say sure. They don't understand that you still have to pay the money.

Bryan: We still have to have a public hearing.

Talbert: You said more than I did. I only said 80%. Thank you Becky.

Staton: People that have come up to me to talk about the issue think we are doing away with the fee. That can't happen.

Carter: People are going to say sure. Bill's right there.

Re: Executive Closed Session

Chambers: Is Mr. Wright here? Can we go into executive session? We still have time for executive session.

Stish: I make a motion to enter into executive closed session under Consultation with legal counsel and briefings by staff members or consultants pertaining to actual or probable litigation, where such consultation or briefing in open meeting would adversely affect the negotiating or litigating posture of the public body; and consultation with legal counsel employed or retained by a public body regarding specific legal matters requiring the provision of legal advice by such counsel. §2.2-3711.7

Chambers: Second.

Allen: We have a motion and a second to go into executive session. Any discussion. Let's vote. 7 yes.

Supervisor Stish moved, Supervisor Chambers seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to go into executive closed session under Section 2.2-3711.7.

Re: Return to Regular Session and Certification

Supervisor Stish moved, Supervisor Snoddy seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to return to regular session and to certify that to the best of each member's knowledge only public business matters as were identified by the motion by which the closed executive meeting was convened were heard, discussed or considered in the executive closed session.

Re: Call to Order, Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance

Chairman Allen called the meeting to order. Supervisor Talbert gave the invocation and the Pledge of Allegiance was said by all who were in attendance.

Re: Quorum

Chairman Allen certified there was a quorum. Seven of seven members present. The meeting could continue.

Re: Announcements

There were none.

Re: Approval of agenda

Allen: We have approval of agenda.

Re: Approval of Minutes

Allen: Approval of minutes. We've had a motion and a second made to approve the minutes. Any comments? Seeing none, let's vote. 7 yes. So approved.

Supervisor Snoddy moved, Supervisor Stish seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to approve the July 13, 2015 minutes as presented.

Re: Approval of Claims

Stish: So moved, Mr. Chairman

Bryan: Second.

Allen: A motion and a second. Any discussion? No discussion. Let's vote. 7 yes. Claims approved.

Supervisor Stish moved, Supervisor Bryan seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to approve the claims as presented.

Re: Public Comment

Allen: If anyone has any public comment that has nothing to do with the public hearing, you have three minutes. Come to the podium and state your name and district.

Kenda Hanuman: Good evening. I'm Kenda Hanuman from Mrs. Stish's District 5. As always I believe we are all here because we care about Buckingham County. Thank you for your willingness tonight to hear experts speak on the Atlantic Coast Pipeline and its impact on our county. Spencer Phillips is an economist and a UVA professor who's been contracted by organizations in Highland, Augusta, Nelson and Buckingham County's to research the economic impact of the proposed pipeline on each individual county. He's come from Charlottesville tonight and has been given only 5 minutes to speak to you. I would hope you might allow a little bit more time if needed. Kirk Bower is a retired engineer and the pipeline's campaign manager for the Virginia Chapter of the Sierra Club. He has a resolution to present on the preparation of the erosion and sediment control plan for the Atlantic Coast Pipeline regarding the safety of our county's water supply. He has also made the trip from Charlottesville to speak and I would hope he might get more than five minutes if appropriate as well. As we near the approval of the five year Comprehensive Plan for Buckingham I ask that we as the caretakers of this county give

special care and forward thinking to our county and its future. If we don't make that commitment, who will? Thank you.

Joe Abbate: Hello. I'm Joe Abbate. I'm in District 5 served well by Mrs. Stish. I want to thank the staff in administration of the County of Buckingham for making the building of my small home which has finally been finished so smooth and professional. Every one of the staff helped me pass the permit processes and health department and everybody. I just want to thank everyone for making that happen and making me a proud resident here in Buckingham. Only final comments is I highly promote the idea of Broadband. That's internet access throughout the county for both emergency response, educational purposes and the ability to monitor crop and agricultural information. I will be giving Mrs. Stish as much support as I can with regards to that. Thank you very much.

Quinn Robinson: Good evening Members of the Board and fellow citizens. My name is Quinn Robinson. I live in the Andersonville area up near VDOT headquarters. I just want to raise two things. The Comprehensive Plan which apparently is not quite complete and I think we need more time to consider it. We wanted to do a review of it but it wasn't complete and it may be that if you schedule the meeting for September we will have enough time to get that in order. It seems to lack any specific reference to the Atlantic Coast Pipeline which during public participation and input, it was strongly opposed. It's not going to help this county at all. I've heard there are other pipelines being developed for presentation to FERC and if they come here once, they will be back again. Please protect this county. The other thing is directly about the pipeline. As I said it does us no good. It's a direct threat to basic nature as far as I'm concerned. The forest service gave a remarkable report that is part of the record now about what it presents to them and why it shouldn't be done. Much the same would apply here in Buckingham. Local government, everything has been tribulized because Dominion has its own way of doing things. They seem to have a way of persuading people. One might call it corrupting the system. It's unfortunate and it's wrong. But that's what's happening. Virginia hasn't always been in the forefront of building a positive culture. We were wrong on civil rights. We are wrong on tobacco. We are wrong on the climate change business sense stopping these fossil fuels. The final thing, the settlement on the tobacco, they lied to us. They told us it was ok and they made a fortune off of it. They ended up having to pay a fund to the states, \$206,000,000. I can promise you when this focuses on the terms of the abuse and damage of fossil fuels, that will be triple, quadruple. All that money will come from the people who are selling these fuels and people who own the stocks and it will be a great day for this country.

Heather Nolan: Good evening. I'm Heather Nolan. I'm also in Cassandra Stish's district. I would also like to speak to the Atlantic Coast Pipeline and the compressor station that is proposed for Buckingham County. I would like to echo the concern that there is still not information really provided to the public on this issue. There has been a request for a public hearing on the pipeline and the compressor station here in Buckingham. That has still not happened. It would be our hope that that could possibly be in the works. There are a lot of young people in the room tonight and I think that this generation, future generations will be looking at many of us and where we stood on fossil fuels. Are we invested in polluting energy or

whether we took the steps to invest in solar, wind and other alternatives that can keep what is so beautiful in Buckingham still beautiful and our air really clean. I applaud the Board for your April letter and resolution to FERC and I hope tonight that we can learn what you have heard in response. You said some really important things in your documents to them. Specifically you were concerned about protecting the residents from air pollution and contamination of our soil and water and we are with you on that. We hope that you will have some answers. Thank you.

Heidi Berthoud: Hi. I'm Heidi Berthoud. I am in Cassandra Stish's district. I wanted to remind ourselves about the opinion that the Virginia Attorney General Mark Herring issued as an official advisory opinion of May 5th of this year. Holding that Virginia localities have the right to prohibit hydraulic fracking, fracturing, or fracking as part of their power to regulate land use within their boundaries. The letter reverses a two year old opinion by former Attorney General Ken Cuccinelli and so my request for you is that the Board of Supervisors enter this prohibition on fracking into the five year comp plan now and also I'd like to request that you ask the Attorney General to expand his opinion to include compressor stations which of course carry fracked gas. Just to name some of the pollutants that are carried in this fracked gas and some of these are hard to pronounce. Methane, that's pretty easy to pronounce. Light and heavy alkane. BTX which includes benzene, toluene, ethylbenzene, diene, hydrogen carbon sulfide, sulfur dioxide, formaldehyde, particular let matter, carbon monoxide, voc's, anyway the list goes on and on. This is what we'd be inviting into our county and it's not a matter of if, it's a matter of when as we know from much too much history on this. So, I thank you for your consideration.

Christy Abayathiel (?): I am Christy Abayathiel. Thank you all for allowing us to have this comment time. I am a property owner here in Buckingham and I love the beauty and peace here. I really see by allowing this pipeline through our county we brace threats that is not necessary in the name of economic development which we could bring economic development to our county in safer ways that would be for the benefit of all. Specifically through clean renewable sources of energy. So I am specifically concerned about the upcoming comprehensive plan and would like to see it thoroughly addressed, both the pipeline and compressor station. And I also would like to specifically ask that the Board of Supervisors make a request of FERC that we have baseline studies of our air, water and soil to make sure that what we have now the quality is maintained. Because I really don't think that would be the case and I personally don't see the preventive measures are better than trying to clean up something after the fact. So, I would like to ask you to take that into consideration and again perhaps it is well worth of delaying our full view of the comprehensive plan, so that we could ensure the safety and wellbeing of our county. This is a big event. I don't think we should treat it lightly or casually or try to rush through the comprehensive plan. It will be with us for five years. Alright. That's it. Thank you very much for your attention.

Swami Dayananda: Good evening. My name is Swami Dayananda from Satchinanda Ashram Yogaville. That is in District #5. I serve there as a Director of Yogaville Environmental Solutions which looks for the long term transformation of our community to sustainable living. For more renewable energy use. Our short term goal to oppose the pipeline that is proposed to come near us. Recently I was at Planning Commissions meeting and I was very grateful to see

the five year draft of the planning commission. May I be given five minutes as I'm speaking for the organization? I am speaking on behalf of Yogaville.

Allen: Yes.

Swami Dayananda: Thank you. In that planning draft, it said that it is being made to prepare for future changes in the community such as population, size and employment base and environmental quality. To create policies to protect the public health and safety and welfare of local residents. Certainly if the proposed pipeline were to come near us, it will be a very big change for all of us in Buckingham County and in Virginia. So I would just like to mention some concerns that we have. That I believe the Board of Supervisors can help to address and you already have in fact expressed in your resolution, Mitigation Resolution in April. We would certainly like very much that health impacts to the citizens of Buckingham especially to the ones who will be living very close to it at Union Hill Baptist population which may be 1 mile or 2 from there. If it were to come, the Pastor Paul says they may have to move the church. They will lose their place of worship. So I believe we really need to pay attention to it. Yogaville would be 5 miles or so proposedly, and as we do practices for health, scientifically and antidotally, it is said it would be 8 miles from compressor station. There is a great health hazard. It will affect our classes. Safety and first response by fire and rescue issues, that's something we would like to be considered. Devaluation of land in Yogaville's district. We have been growing 50%. We have now over 100 new homes in Yogaville where there were no homes before. We would certainly like to continue to grow locally and also with many more people coming to build homes there. Environmental issues of course, we are very saddened that a mile from Lotus, The Light of Universal Shrine, Dominion plans to do horizontal drilling which means that they will come to the river go under for I don't know how many feet, cross below the river, come up and onto the land. We are very concerned for James River. We would really like to see that that will be paid attention to. Then at the end I would like to say in the section of the Specialty Policy areas, Yogaville Village Center, there was a beautiful description of the community, diverse community we are. People of all different faith and background coming to try to live as peaceful and harmonious and peaceful and useful life as possible. In it, it also says that Board of Supervisors and the leadership of Buckingham County feel that it's imperative that Yogaville leadership and the leadership of Buckingham and the citizens of Buckingham County develop a communication or more communication. We are very interested as I speak on behalf of the board of trustees of Yogaville, to certainly look into more ways to develop that communication and we look forward to working with the Board of Supervisors for the benefit of service and prosperity of Buckingham County. Thank you so much for your time.

Wayne Braxton: Good evening. As you well know, I'm Wayne Braxton. I'm here tonight to show my appreciation to Buckingham Supervisors and Sheriff's Department of Buckingham County. I'm here to show my appreciation for the plaque. I want to thank everyone that made it possible and I will cherish it for the rest of my life. This weekend has been a blessing. I've had more phone calls, emails, and Facebooks. I felt that I needed to share it with Buckingham County. I'm not going to take up much of your time. I thank you and I appreciate it with all my heart.

Marie Flowers: I'm Marie Flowers and I'm from Bill Talbert's district so listen up Bill. I just brought this article from the Washington Post from August 6th and I brought it because I know you all can't keep up on everything but anyway it's from Union, WV. Opponents of the Mountain Valley Pipeline in West Virginia won a round Wednesday in Monroe County when the circuit court judge ruled that surveyors of the pipeline could not enter the property of county landowners who prohibited such access. It goes on it say that Virginia law allows pipeline companies to survey without the owner's permission if the company follows notification procedure. After the trial on Wednesday morning, in Union, WV, Judge Robert Iron said Mountain Valley Pipeline has failed to establish as required by West Virginia law, that the pipeline project offered sufficient public use for West Virginians to justify entering private property without an owner's permission.

Re: VDOT: Road Matters

Allen: There is no one here from VDOT. Does any board member have any road matters?

Re: Zoning Matters: Public Hearing for Case 15-SUP230-LINK, LLC Private School

Cobb: Yes, this is Case 15-SUP230 for a Special Use Permit for a private school on Tax Map Section 140, Lot 56 and Section 154 Lot 1 containing an approximate 350 acres, off of High Rock Road and New Dominion Lane in the Curdsville Magisterial district.

The Planning Commission held their public hearing on June 22, 2015. At that time there were no comments against this request. The Planning Commission recommends approval with conditions that have been provided. Are there any questions for me?

1. That all federal, state, and local laws, regulations, permit requirements and ordinances will be adhered to.
2. That commencement of the business shall begin within one year of the approval by the Board of Supervisors or this special use permit shall be null and void.
3. That the applicant pursues a commercial solid waste container and follow the County Solid Waste Ordinance.
4. The permittee or their agent shall secure and maintain sufficient insurance to protect against liability for personal injury and property damage that may arise from the activities performed under this special use permit and from the operation of the permitted activity and such insurance shall extend to the benefit of personal injury or property damage that occurs off premises by employees, agents, invitees, guests, contractors and students of the permittee. Insurance must be obtained prior to start of permitted activity and shall remain valid through the time the permittee conducts activity under the special use permit. The Zoning Administrator may require a valid certificate or letter of insurance from the issuing insurance agent or agency prior to issuing the special use permit. Failure to maintain such insurance shall be grounds to revoke such permit.

5. The students shall be monitored and prevented from trespassing on adjacent parcels. If students trespass and are a private nuisance to the neighbors then the permit may be revoked by the Board of Supervisors through public hearing.
6. That all documentation submitted by the applicant in support of this special use permit request becomes a part of the conditions.
7. Nothing in this approval shall be deemed to obligate the county to acquire any interest in property, to construct, maintain or operate any facility or to grant any permits or approvals except as may be directly related hereto.
8. That the property be kept neat and orderly.
9. In the event that any one or more of the conditions is declared void for any reason whatever, such decision shall not affect the remaining portion of the permit, which shall remain in full force and effect, and for this purpose, the provisions of this are hereby declared to be severable.
10. That any infraction of the above mentioned conditions could lead to a stop order and discontinuation of the special use permit, if it be the wishes of the Planning Commission or Board of Supervisors.
11. That the applicant(s) understands the conditions and agrees to the conditions.
12. No school structure greater than 150 square feet shall be erected within 100' of adjoining properties without adjacent landowner's written permission.
13. The Buckingham County Noise Ordinance must be adhered to.
14. The County Zoning Administrator and one other County staff member, as appointed by the County Administrator, shall be allowed to enter the property at any time to check for compliance with the provisions of this permit.

The applicant is also here if you have questions for them.

Allen: We will open the public hearing to the public on the private school.

Marie Flowers: Do I need to introduce myself again? Marie Flowers, Bill Talbert's friend. I think this idea is really wonderful. My question is, I think at the Planning Commission meeting it was designated as a "for profit" school. I was wondering where the profit would come from?

Staton: Tuition.

Flowers: Boarding?

Staton: Room and board and tuition.

Flowers: Ok. The students that will go there will have enough affordability to pay that tuition or what?

Staton: I don't know.

Flowers: You don't know. That's the thing that I'm asking.

Bill Lay: The school will be a tuition based school. It will be for both public and private tuition for students to attend. The base of our students will come from the Department of Social Services. So it will be a tuition based, room and board and that's where the funding will come from.

Flowers: The tuition will come from Social Services?

Lay: Either social services or by private families. Some families pay tuition. It's very similar to the programs at Fork Union and other facilities around the county.

Flowers: I just have a small item, I don't know if I have a small moral problem with this if social services should be giving you profit. Not that I'm against profit.

Lay: If I could just briefly address that. The majority of the programs provided by social services are for foster care children. In the State of Virginia, the average foster care child goes between 8 and 12 foster care homes a year. Our target student will be the child that end up not really fitting into that program. At the age of 18, foster care kids are turned off from all support and if you have 18 year olds in your family, you know the amount of information that is to be provided by a parent or relative in that process. The foster care children don't have that. It is a statistic that at the age of 18 foster care children age out of the program, 50% of these children are either homeless, incarcerated and more than 6% of the females become pregnant the first year. What's happening in this process, once the child starts down that road, it becomes very difficult to turn around and receive the ability to recover from that. That's why now you see a higher increase of homeless people on the streets that are of the younger age. They have no place to go and through our school we hope to be able to offer them an educational foundation, a vocational skill and a life learning process that will enable them to be both stable and independent for life. I know that I'm over speaking this, but for Buckingham County and our State of Virginia this is a very good process. The State of Virginia currently ranks 48 in support of foster care children. We are one of the wealthiest, most educated states in our nation and our foster care support is at the very bottom. It will be a co-educational program as well however, the male portion is a higher degree of probability.

Flowers: Will there be a wall up to separate them?

Lay: They will be segregated and as we continue to grow there will be a process of buildings that will house that.

Allen: Can you state your name?

Lay: I'm sorry. I am Bill Lay and I'm the Administrative Director of the Virginia Key School and a resident of Buckingham County as of June.

Allen: Would anybody else like to speak?

Janet Miller: Good evening. I'm Janet Miller and I'm from the Maysville District. I would like to speak in favor of any kind of educational program. Particularly those which will deal with the very necessary support of foster students and children and youth. Because this is an area we need to do better at and there are so many ways to do it. But education and preparing someone with life skills is the best way. I think we owe it to the young people to be a part of this.

Chad Oba: Good evening. My name is Chad Oba. I am in Joe Chambers' district, Slate River. I hadn't prepared anything tonight. I wasn't intending to speak. I'm not going to speak about the pipeline. I am going to echo what Janet Miller just said. I have worked in the field of mental health with children for 20 years here in the county. We need to support our children that do not have support any other way. Something like this coming into the county I think is a great benefit to all of us and we need to embrace it. That's all I have to say.

Allen: Anyone else want to speak? If not, I'll close the public hearing.

Chambers: I make a motion that we approve the recommendation of the Planning Commission.

Talbert: Second.

Allen: There's been a motion made and a second. Any discussion? Let's vote. 7 yes. So approved. Good luck.

Supervisor Chambers moved, Supervisor Talbert seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to approve the Special Use Permit for case 15-SUP230 for LLINK, LLC for a private school with the above mentioned conditions.

Re: Buckingham County Youth League 15-19 Year Old Virginia State Baseball Championship

Wes Saxon: Mr. Chairman, Supervisor's, I'm Wes Saxon. It is my great pleasure this year to be the manager for the Buckingham County Dixie Majors Boys Baseball Team which won the State Championship. The first time we've won a state championship since I believe 1992 according to our resident guru, Donnie Davis. We had to do it by beating Goochland with a double header on the same night, back to back. The championship game was the only home game we won all season in the tournament. I'm pleased to say tonight, that we would like to personally thank the Supervisors for your support financially and thank the school board for use of their field. There was a state tournament at Gene Dixon and were not able to use their field and knowing we had to play on a grass infield, the school board was gracious enough to let us practice there. Many individuals and businesses in the area came to our support. We were the last team to qualify for the Dixie World Series in Ozark, Alabama. We had about a week to get everything together. One of the coaches wives works for Hampden Sydney and she was able to supply a block of rooms for us and even have an option of a bus if we felt that would be efficient and that turned

out to not be efficient. It would've saved me 7 stitches in the head if we had taken it but that's another story. Everybody was great, one child when we were going around asking, emptied his pocket and gave all the change he had to us. I would like to thank and recognize my coaches, Cameron Gilliam, Bobby Jacob, and John Stearrett. This was a total team effort. Everyone contributed. Would you also like me to recognize the players, I believe they are all here.

Talbert: Mr. Chairman, I would like to see all the board come down and shake hands with them.

Saxon: As they are coming down, Jesse Hickman; Pablo Logan McDonald Byrd; Devin Allen; Dustin Carroll; Raquon Gough; Parker Shumaker; G.G. "Red" Trent Jacobs; Hunter Shumaker; Hunter Gilliam; Justin Clabough; Nick Grigg; Clayton Davis; Seth Davis; Sam Chandler; Bobby Jacobs; Cameron Gilliam; and John Stearrett.

A couple of things I'd like to add, we were the last team to qualify for the world series in Ozark, Alabama which meant we had less time to prepare than all the other teams. It was a 12 team format. Ozark the host team, had the most to prepare because they knew they were in it no matter what. Everybody else had to prepare. We stayed in Duluth, Alabama which was 20 some miles away. To me it didn't bother me because my father grew up in Duluth and I still have family there and I know the area somewhat. We did beat the Alabama all-star team and I understand their pitcher was a division 1 pitcher. The two teams we lost to, both finished 2nd and 3rd. One of them almost won the thing. I'm surprised they didn't. We are the first Buckingham team to have won a game in the World Series as far as we know. I couldn't be any prouder. The majors World Series is for 17-19 year old players. We took 15-19 year old players. We had 1-15 year old; but sitting here tonight, I remember that we doused one of them after we won the state tournament because he just turned 16. So I actually won with 2-15 year olds; 2-16 year olds; 3-17; 4-18 and 4-19. The teams that beat us Ozark and Arkansas, my understanding is those were teams that were comprised entirely of college players, division 2,3,1 players, whatever. So we are playing against a much higher level competition than what we are used to and they still did well. I can't say enough for the parents supporting the players going down there. They made sure our jersey's got washed at night and hung on special hangers so they would be ready. One parent soaked the pants in their sub tub overnight and had washed and dried and folded out for the players. My pants came back cleaner than they ever had been. That's after one of my sons wore them playing high school ball. Everybody pitched in. If I needed water or Gatorade, one parent would go picked stuff up. The hotel worked with us because we didn't know with a 10:30 game if we would win, lose, stay another night or whatever. They worked with us. I understand they never had the first complaint from any of our people staying there. Taking a group of 15-19 year olds 700 miles away and not have any complaints from where we are staying I think that's outstanding. They are a great group of players. I'd also like to recognize Jack Stearrett. Jack is the President of Buckingham County Youth League who is sitting over there. Even coming back up the road I had an accident and ended up having to have stiches when I got back to Farmville but one parent caught up with me and helped clean my head from where the trunk hit my head. In conclusion, we all received a medal and ribbon for making the World Series and tonight I would like to make a special

presentation because we were several medals short. This goes to an individual that has meant more probably to the Youth League and the players for years. That's Donnie Davis.

Davis: Thank yall.

Saxon: Donnie has worked with this program for I don't know how many years. He worked with the county beforehand. If I ever had a question like I had in the state tournament, I'd walk over and say "Donnie, what's the rule on this?" Donnie has forgotten more baseball than most of us would ever imagine. Thank you and thank you Donnie for everything you have done for us and the children and players through the years.

Davis: Thank the Board for all yalls support in all the years I worked for you and the many years after.

Allen: Thank you. You've done a good job.

Re: Michael Womack, Forest Management Specialist Re: Presentation of County Forest Products Sales

Womack: Good evening. Mr. Chairman, members of the Board. I am Michael Womack and I work with the Department of Forestry with State Forest in Buckingham and Appomattox. I'm here to give you a presentation on what we've done over the past year and present you with the county's share of the proceeds of timber sales in the forest. This year we've done maintenance on the state forest. We've collected cones from the seed orchard. The seeds from those cones are used to provide seedlings for the landowners and state to plant seedlings on their land. This year we were happy to get a donation from the National Wild Turkey Federation and we used that donation to plant some game patches for turkey on the State Forests. We've had our usual groups doing studies on the State Forests this year. The Geological Survey, Virginia Tech, NC State and we've had a lot of students from Virginia Tech and UVA and NC State working on their degrees in the State Forests. Some of them are working on Master's Degrees and Doctrine Degrees and we are happy to help them out with that. This year we had the 69th Annual Forestry Camp on the State Forest. Students stayed over at the 4-H camp and that's been going on for 69 years now. It provides the opportunity for high school students across the state to study forestry and natural resources. Something new we have in the state forest in Buckingham this year is the Department held its 15th Annual Fire Academy this year over at Longwood University and we used the state forest for the field exercise portion. We had over 300 fire fighters from throughout the state and other states working on fire tactics, engine operations, operations with the use of chainsaws and then one night we had a live fire exercise that they were able to come out there and practice their skills in controlled conditions and environment. I'd also like to give our thanks to the Buckingham Sheriff's department. We had a break in at our shop one night and their quick response to that and their diligence in investigating that resulted in the apprehension of the person responsible for that. We also found out that they were responsible for vandalizing some equipment nearby. We appreciate that. As you know the state forest is self-supporting. All of our income comes from selling use permits and harvesting timber on the state forest. We

don't use general fund tax revenue to administer state forests system. The County receives 12 ½% of the timber sales off the state forest land and this year Buckingham gets \$14,118.25.

Talbert: You can come back anytime you want.

Womack: Any questions for me? Thank you.

Re: Kirk Bowers, Virginia Chapter of the Sierra Club Re: Pipeline Erosion and Control Review Request

Talbert: Mr. Chairman, I believe he's asked for 5 minutes.

Bowers: Yes, I do have a presentation. Can I load this real quick? Let me introduce myself, I am Kirk Bowers. I am with the Virginia Chapter Pipelines Campaign Manager. Tonight I'm wearing my professional engineer's hat. I have spent all my life just about in the construction industry, heavy construction and design of highways, roads, bridges and large projects all throughout the state and country. Tonight I wanted to show you a few things about the Atlantic Coast Pipeline. This will be my 3rd presentation to Boards. Nelson County passed this resolution two weeks ago. Montgomery County passed it last week. We presented it to Giles County last week also. We are going around the state asking all the Boards to help with this resolution. So let me...can you all see that. I'm also a member of the Dominion pipeline monitoring coalition and we've been doing case studies on pipeline construction throughout the state and in West Virginia. This particular pipeline is the Columbia Gas pipeline in Giles County, Virginia which was just completed last year. This is a picture of the construction site. This is about a 50' cleared right of way on this particular mountainside. This is the overall areal of the pipeline corridor. The ACP would be about 2 ½ times wider than the one you see on this particular photograph. What we found was that during a large storm, the sod becomes totally inundated with silt. If you look at the slide you will see that particular device is called a super silt fence which is below the slope of the clearing area. Well that is supposed to be a very strong device to keep sediment from flowing down hillsides on all properties. In this case it didn't work. Here it comes. It's flowing down the mountainside. Keeps on flowing and that's until it hits the stream. This particular stream is filled with mud below the construction site, blocked the stream and they had to put additional devices in there to keep the sediment out of the streams. What was said by the inspector was that he had never seen so much sediment come off the side before and he also said that the sediment down the mountainside looked like a lava flow. Part of the reason is that they are giving pipeline companies variances on their trench links. Usually it's 500 feet of open trench. What we had here was 1000 and 2000 feet of trench link that were open to rain and weather. This was another project currently under construction in West Virginia. We also see on this site from the pictures that the stream is muddy and the road is torn up and collapsing in this area where they put a pipeline in. This particular area we found a contractor illegally dumping sediment into the stream. Look at the slide, look upstream you see it's clear. Look at the stream below the pipes, you will see its muddy. We found illegally discharging into the streams and wetlands in that area. This particular site we found them discharging sediment into wetlands area. The West Virginia DEP also found them. They were issued notices of

violation, reported to the EPA and Corp of Engineers. Here's the stream, it's called Meathouse Fork. It's a disaster area. There are several pipelines coming through here. This is what happens after construction and during construction. These are a couple more slides. You can see the house on the right. It's right next to the pipeline trench. 50 feet from their front porch. Why does this all matter Because ENS plans provide details. They are the guide for building these pipelines. They will guide construction process and also show what has to be done in the field to meet the regulations. Problem is, we met with DEQ a couple months ago, they told us they don't have the resources or the staff to inspect, approve or review these plans. They can't help us out. So now we are going to the counties and the people in the counties to help us get these plans obtained. They operate under Standards and Specs procedure which is different from the county's regulations where you the county actually run the program. DEQ is the overseer for utility companies and pipelines but they don't have the staff or resources to do the job. Also, contractors take shortcuts as you seen in the slides and actually this particular contractor was betting it wouldn't rain that day when they had the disaster on their site. So what should DEQ do? Probably what they will do is nothing unless we ask them to do something and that is what we are here for. So what we'd like to do is the regulations and laws are still in place. It's up to us as citizens and local governments to make them work. The only way we will get access to the plans is DEQ asked them to give us the plans. We are meeting with Secretary Ward in another month to present these resolutions and talk to them about making a policy decision to get these plans submitted. What we are asking you to do is help us get the plans. We want project specific ENS plans for the ACP throughout the state. We want to ask them to give you the localities the right to review the plans and conduct inspections and enforce local ENS regulations. You don't have that right right now. It's not within your purview. Prior to project review and approval, we are asking that Dominion Transmission officials and third party inspectors meet with local counties and go over the procedures and how the project will be operating. So we are asking for your consideration on this matter. I'm not sure if you want to vote on this tonight or would you rather have some time to think about it. It's up to you. Do you have any questions for me?

Allen: Anyone have questions?

Stish: Mr. Chairman, yes I do. Ok. So I want to make sure I've got the ask correct. What you are asking for? You are saying with this request that you want access to the plans, is this because the plans are not accessible currently?

Bowers: They are not.

Stish: Are they drafted?

Bowers: No they are not.

Stish: So if they were drafted, we still wouldn't have access to them?

Bowers: We would not. That's correct. The current situation is that Dominion will not give us the plans unless we require them and ask them to.

Stish: DEQ, would give them to us in any situation regardless of this resolution?

Bowers: Right. They can't get them right now because there is no trigger or applications required to be submitted to DEQ that would trigger their submittal of these plans. Actually natural gas act comes into place somewhere in here that says they are not required because of security issues. Which does not quite make sense to me actually. They are trying to bulk on giving us the plans and Dominion has no plans to give us the plans for review. We need to do this before the project gets down the road. They might give us the plans at the end of the FERC application process but by that time it will be too late for us to review and ask for any revisions to plans.

Stish: So we want basically, the request is to get ahold of plans ahead of time so that the Sierra Club or perhaps others...

Bowers: BPMC

Stish: may make meaningful recommendations to FERC to holster the comments that might be made...

Bowers: Yes that's part of it. We want to demonstrate that there is a problem with the erosion and sediment control plan as the procedure is currently conducted.

Stish: How many of the pictures you showed us tonight are of Dominion Pipeline?

Bowers: I'm sorry.

Stish: How many are Dominion Pipelines that we saw tonight in the slide show?

Bowers: None. Zero.

Stish: So these bad characters that you showed us tonight are not actually the same characters that are coming to here?

Bowers: Right.

Stish: I just want to clarify that because I don't want people to think that these images are the people that's coming here.

Bowers: Well, I know but...

Stish: It's important.

Bowers: I know but I'm a construction engineer and I've been out here in the field for years and this is something that I've seen. It doesn't matter which company it is.

Stish: I understand but I want to make sure that what the public is seeing is actually what is relatable to the issue on the table and its company. When it gets muddy, we are talking about mud, we've got to keep it clean.

Bowers: Dominion does have another pipeline which they have a series of violations on and given a consent order to correct.

Stish: So the problem it sounds like is this Annual Standards and Specifications...

Bowers: Annual Standards and Specifications. It's more like an honor system.

Stish: I gotcha. So it seems like there is a loose standard that's been granted by FERC...

Bowers: By the state actually.

Stish: By the state. The State has granted this annual thing.

Bowers: Correct.

Stish: Ok.

Bowers: They haven't reviewed their specs since 2013 so they are way behind. See there was a transition of the program DCR to DEQ so in the process all of this stuff kind of got shuffled to the back of the pile so they haven't had a chance to look at their specs through the years.

Stish: Yeah, I expect as a regulating agency they are probably a little behind.

Bowers: They don't have the staff.

Stish: They also were just handed the whole Stormwater from counties like us who opted out. They are taking on a lot. A lot is happening in the organization.

Bowers: It is. This is one of my specialty areas and I know a lot about it.

Stish: We can request that they give...we can request that we ask for them that we get them...we can make comments on it I suppose....

Bowers: I will be training people to review the plans. I'm a plan reviewer. I've spent years reviewing plans so I'm going to be here to help out and support yall. So...

Stish: Ok, I think probably my colleagues are going to want to look at this a little more or do you want to deal with it tonight?

Bryan: I have a question.

Bowers: Yes, sir.

Bryan: You listed two counties that have passed the resolution. How many have you been to?

Bowers: Let's see. Two. Both of them passed so far.

Bryan: So, you haven't been to any other counties but the two that passed it and us? The pipeline goes through...

Bowers: Actually I wasn't in Montgomery. They passed that themselves.

Bryan: The pipeline is going through how many counties, 10?

Bowers: I'm working the whole state so I'm not looking at just the Atlantic Coast Pipeline, but the Mountain Valley Pipeline which is the same issues that you have in this area. So, they are concerned about this issues also in Roanoke, Craig, Giles and Franklin are the primary Virginia Properties.

Stish: Because of the hilly terrain?

Bowers: A lot of it is steep terrain, soils are really bad in these mountains and the steepness of the terrains...anything with 8% slope. You have sandy slopes here which are subject to erosion also.

Bryan: You say you are meeting with Secretary Ward when?

Bowers: Then end of the month. I'm still waiting on her to give us some time and dates to sit down and talk to them about this issue.

Stish: I would like to find out what happens at that meeting to see how the state agencies are responding to this. Because I think it's the proper order. I want them to own this. We've been paying billions of dollars to clean up the Chesapeake Bay. All of us are in the Chesapeake Bay Act and all of us have had to pony up for permitting fees and all kinds of rigamonroe. Stormwater. All of this stuff for the Bay. I cannot believe that they are going to allow without looking at it a little bit when this project is going right through and up in any of that work. They get upset when Farmer Joe's cows get in the creek. I think they are going to have a big problem with 150 foot swath going down an 8% grade. So I'd like to hear what you have after your meeting with the Secretary, I'd like to find out about that. Maybe you can get with the County Administrator with the results of that. Maybe some notes from that that can be shared with this

Board. That is my motion this evening gentlemen, I would like to entertain maybe next month or when we've heard back from Mr. Bowers. I appreciate your time in bringing your presentation to us.

Bowers: That would be fine. I appreciate your time.

Allen: So your motion is to what?

Stish: To carry it to the next meeting.

Allen: There has been a motion and a second to carry this to the next meeting or until we get more information?

Stish: Until we get more information and if it's the next meeting great.

Allen: Any more discussion?

Talbert: Yes, Mr. Chairman. I don't have any problem with going and getting information but I think we are doing something that our county attorney four months ago or five months ago, there is nothing we can do. It's basically, if you want to do this, I'll vote for your motion but we are going against what our county attorney has told us that we have no resources...

Stish: We can request information.

Talbert: I'm going to vote for it. I'm just simply saying...I don't know.

Bryan: I need clarification on the motion. Just to delay action on the resolution...

Stish: Just until we hear back with the results of that meeting.

Talbert: I'm going to vote for it.

Allen: A motion was made and seconded. We will wait for any vote until we get more information. Let's vote. 6 yes 1 no. Passes to wait for more information.

Supervisor Stish moved, Supervisor Chambers seconded to wait to vote on the proposed resolution until after the board has more information of the results of meeting with Sierra Club and Secretary Ward. This motion passed with a 6-1 vote. Supervisor Snoddy opposing.

Re: Friends of Buckingham, Spencer Phillips, Key-Log Economics, LLC Re: Economic Impact of the Atlantic Coast Pipeline and Compressor Station

Phillips: Hello, thank you for having me. My name is Spencer Phillips. I am an Economist. My company is Key-Log Economics and I'm a part time instructor at the University of Virginia

in Environmental Economics, Natural Resource Policy and GIS and a couple other things when they ask me. So, I've been retained as Hanuman said earlier by Friends of Buckingham and Friends of Nelson County, Augusta County Alliance and Highlanders for Responsible Development to look into the economics of the Atlantic Coast Pipeline. The reason for that is, it kind of reminds me a little bit back when I was a student at UVA played in the Pep band and there was a running joke and at half time we would say here's a partial score for you, William and Mary 17. That is sort of what we've gotten from Dominion. We were told the benefits from this pipeline in terms of jobs, tax revenue for local jurisdictions and possibly down the line access to gas for manufacturing firms or something like that. But we haven't heard the other half of the score. We haven't heard what the other side is. Everyone knows if you are going into business, considering anything like a public works project, you need to consider the benefits as well as the costs and public benefits as opposed to private benefits. That's another matter for another day. I would love to come back when I have a little more time and I'm done with my study and talk to you about what good estimates of those costs would be. Tonight is the trail or the teaser for that. I really wanted to let you know what the questions are and I hope those will be your questions too as you get the opportunity as FERC continues its process. An interesting thing that Dominion's contractors have said is that it's impossible because there are not established methods for estimating those costs. Now I've got 27 years of experience of my own and there is 25-30 years beyond that before me, economist have been studying this stuff. A rack of books in my library and thousands of people all over the country and all over the world that knows it is possible to get the economic costs of natural resources, damages, estimate the economic loss of property values, lost agricultural productivity, lost tourism value and so they are simply things that need to be examined. What Dominion has said about it so far is simply unbelievably false. So, we are going to be correcting that and have this reviewed as far as some estimates of benefits go and can I give you something for the record? This is simply some of my comments to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission dealing with these questions with the pipeline but specifically on page 6, critics of the analysis that Dominion did that there were going to be job and income benefits. There are problems with the methods. They were poor methods and they were poorly applied by both of Dominion's contractors in this case. I won't bore you with the details of this but they are such that you can't...the methods were designed for estimating impacts that would occur in a one year period of time. Long story short, they took their benefits and projected them out 20 years. Complete abuse of method. Now, as for what some of the cost would be, they really come in three categories. At least what I'm looking at. There are impacts on property values. The right of way of the pipeline itself will cross 116 properties in Buckingham County with a combined total value of \$30,000,000 almost \$31,000,000. The evacuation zone which is 1.3 miles wide in diameter should there be a leak or explosion and anybody living in that will be living in a constant worry that that would happen and it has an impact on property values. When you look at that zone, you have 865 properties worth \$118.102 million which translates into property values. Living in that area, if one day people would want to sell that property, that's going to have an impact on the market value and have an impact on their wellbeing and simply put, people could possibly lose in economic terms more than 110% of the value of their property. That is one of the scenarios we will be looking at in this study. Another thing for you all to think about because it goes right to your bottom line, is public service costs. Fire and rescue. Road repair. Lots more heavy equipment. Public

service costs are going to go up. Lost development value is an important one. I probably don't have to tell you that this is a great place to live. You've had your population increase by 10% since 2000. Retirees are moving here. You have lower unemployment. Higher per capita personal income growth. Higher employment growth than the average rural parts of Virginia. That's the kind of apple cart that can be upset if you lose your beauty, way of life, quality of life that people are coming here for in the first place. My time is up so I would love to come back another time when I have results and share them in detail. Thank you.

Re: Zoning Matters: Introduction of proposed revised Comprehensive Plan for consideration for a public hearing

Cobb: Yes, tonight I have the Comprehensive Plan. Tonight I am just asking you to set a public hearing for that. Mary Hickman is here if you have questions for her. I will note that I've looked through what you all have been given as far as the comprehensive plan and the Planning Commission did make some changes and I think you were given the one that didn't have the changes. So we will get those to you. We have them in the office someone just clicked on the wrong link. There were minimal changes that the Planning Commission made at the last public hearing. Two of the main, I guess, substantial changes were to change regarding the library in the goals, objectives and strategies and also a change on map for Dillwyn growth area. Taking out a little section of that. Just to put that bug in your ear that we will get you that new revision tomorrow and you can see those changes and they will be in there as well as get it online for the other folks who want to review it. That's it unless you have anything for me and also Mary is here from the CRC if you have questions for her on any part of the document so far.

Talbert: I'd like to make a motion to have the public hearing at 7:15 at the next meeting.

Allen: September 14th. I have a motion and a second to hold a public hearing on September 14th meeting. Any discussion?

Stish: Mr. Chairman, I would like to make a quick comment. There were several comments and requests regarding the plan during public comment period. I just wanted to address those real fast. ACP specifically, pipelines in general, fracking, these are all issues that we can continue to work on and evolve. The Comprehensive Plan can be amended. It can be added to. It's a living document. It's not to be put on a shelf and forgotten for five years. I think the changes that are in here are a series of changes to bring it into compliance with the current Virginia Code which we've done and we also addressed a few other things in the meantime such as growth area and business development zones. I think at this point we do not have enough dialogue to address something as large as the ACP as a Board and as a Planning Commission. We need some more work sessions to do so. So at this point, I think I would support moving forward with the hearing as it is and do some work sessions at a later date.

Allen: Anybody else? Let's vote. 7 yes to move it on to the next meeting for public hearing.

Supervisor Talbert moved, Supervisor Snoddy seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to hold a public hearing on the proposed Comprehensive Plan at the September 14th Board of Supervisors meeting.

Re: Consider appointment to the Southside Community College Board

Talbert: Mr. Chairman, I've spoken with Ben Johnson and he said he had to decline because he had so many other meetings. So I talked to Pete Senger, and he hadn't gotten back with me. I think he will take it so let's put it off to next month. Does that give us enough time? I think he will take it. He will be a good one.

Re: Consider contracting with Commonwealth Regional Council for updating of Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan

Carter: We've always participated with them. The share per locality will range from \$1774 to \$3339 depending on participation by non-member localities. It is a requirement to do this.

Stish: I make a motion to sign with the CRC a contract for the Hazard Mitigation Plan.

Bryan: Second.

Allen: We have a motion and a second. Any discussion? Let's vote. 7 yes.

Supervisor Stish moved, Supervisor Bryan seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to contract with the CRC for the Hazard Mitigation Plan.

Re: Consider issue of reimbursement to Cumberland County for \$2,782.93 Mobile Home Titling Tax

DMV sends lump sum titling tax to Buckingham County quarterly.

At this time, the Treasurer and Commissioner of Revenue have not received a report that the \$2,782.93 was sent to Buckingham County, however in all probability since this was in May, 2014 it was sent in with a quarterly lump sum amount.

I ask approval, once we get confirmation of receipt of this money from DMV with a title number, that approval be granted to reimburse Cumberland County for Titling Tax that was erroneously assessed as a mobile home in Buckingham County.

Allen: We have a motion and a second. Any discussion? Let's vote. 7 yes.

Supervisor Snoddy moved, Supervisor Bryan seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to approve to reimburse \$2,782.93 to Cumberland County for Mobile Home Titling Tax that was sent to Buckingham instead of Cumberland County.

Re: Consider official vote for granting of \$3,000 to the Buckingham County Youth League for 15-19 year old Virginia State Championship Ball Team for cost associated with participating in the 2015 Dixie World Series in Alabama

Allen: We've already discussed this. We just have to do it officially. There's been a motion and a second. Let's vote. 7 yes.

Supervisor Bryan moved, Supervisor Chambers seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to officially take action on the polling of the Board to give the Buckingham County Youth League \$3,000 for cost associated with 15-19 year old team going to the Dixie World Series in Alabama.

Re: Other Board Matters

Stish: Mr. Chairman, I just wanted to quickly mention again to those who inquired during public comment, to my knowledge FERC has not addressed us back at all. They gave us no response. They totally ignored everything we said to them. I'm sorry to say. It's mind boggling how this group does not listen. Which does not terribly much surprise me but I was hopeful that they would have at least responded out of courtesy. So no hearing for us. No recognition of the environmental mitigation request that we had sent them. From what it seems, not much. Just wanted to let you know.

Staton: All of the stuff that you asked about, that you are concerned about was in that resolution. They refused to respond. That means there is nothing we can do.

Stish: Dominion has a copy of the same resolution and have been requested of the same things. They are going through the process as per their process and they are basically sticking with the FERC process and that's what they are sticking with. So, that's their line the whole time.

There was a question from the audience that did not pick up on tape.

Stish: I don't know if they will do that or not. We can ask them.

Staton: I doubt if they would show up. Seriously.

Stish: They did a year ago. We can ask them. I would imagine they would come after their application finalized and submitted.

Carter: Then they will know the route.

Stish: They still don't know the route yet. So when that's all finalized.

More comment from audience.

Stish: Ms. Nolan, they won't until it's all finalized and submitted.

Allen: Any other board matters?

Re: County Attorney Matters

There were none.

Re: County Administrator's Report

Update regarding Supervisor's comments regarding the BARN: My first item is that during the July meeting Supervisor Talbert provided you all with some changes that was requested of him to be made to the Special Use Permit for the BARN project. The procedure for those changes would be that they would have to go before the Planning Commission and Zoning Office first to have those changes made to their special use permit. So, Mrs. Cobb did contact them and they told her that they would be talking to their board. We haven't heard anything back yet. I wanted to let you all know and Supervisor Talbert know that we did follow through on that.

Virginia House of Delegates resolution commending Buckingham Branch Railroad's 25th year of exceptional service to Central Virginia: The other item is really just for your information that Bob and Annie Bryant, Buckingham Branch Railroad has received a resolution from the General Assembly for their 25 years of operating railroad lines and providing jobs. They did have a very nice ceremony there and presented the resolution to them by Matt Farris there.

VDOT-HB2: One thing that I added on because this came after I sent the Board packet out and it's regarding VDOT House Bill 2. I met with Keven Wright and Scot Shippee with VDOT, and the purpose was to discuss House Bill 2 and to discuss any projects Buckingham County may be eligible for. You may have heard several comments through the meetings when HB2 was discussed that the money won't go here. But it won't come here if we don't apply for it. While there is not a lot of money allocated to our district, I feel that we need to make application and complete the projects we may be eligible for. I really believe they want their plan to work so they will want to see some of the money come to the rural areas, so Scot and Kevin have really encouraged us to look at this and make application. The categories that they are looking for are roads with statewide significance and we don't have any roads that do that. Regional Network and Urban Development areas and recently added Safety concerns. Mrs. Cobb met with us and we've been looking at Urban Development and that is probably not something we are ready for this year. The Category that they suggest we may be eligible for is the Regional Network category and the Safety Concern category. The Regional Network is something like Rt. 20 taking us to Charlottesville. So what they are going to do they have some preliminary scorings done by VDOT Lynchburg office on some of our roads and they are going to come back to us with some of the priorities that they think would qualify. So just wanted to let you know and will stay in touch with you as we move forward with application.

Talbert: Do you need a motion for this?

Carter: No, this is just for your information.

Staton: When can we see this program itself? I want to read what it's about.

Carter: I can get it to you but it's online.

Staton: Thank you.

Stish: When you are speaking with them, would you query, there is a list of about 15 significant safety concerns that I have regarding the whole Yogaville corridor across that area. There is so much pedestrian, bike traffic, cars in and out, new driveways. That whole center there with multiple driveways, tourism. There is a lot happening there. I've been talking to Kevin Wright and Scot Shippee for about two years about widening that road or doing a bike lane. It's not a lot but it's definitely a safety concern. Even perhaps to the point of installing street lights in some areas to protect pedestrians. There's a lot of pedestrians and it's dark, dark, dark. So, would you just float that up there to see what we have to do?

Carter: Yeah, and we will also give you all a list of some of the things that will score and won't score. Actually one of the things they brought up which was on the first priority was Georgia Creek. There's a site problem there and a flooding problem there. They said it may qualify in the Regional Networking category because it connects to 20.

Stish: Isn't it already on the Six Year Plan?

Carter: Not for that.

Staton: The road itself is but not that problem.

Carter: When they get the list...I know you've been talking to them.

Staton: 705 and 656 at Well water School has absolutely no sight distance at all. If you have to turn in, either one of those roads, you kick it and leave black marks because you would never have time to get across there if you didn't.

Chambers: 705. I've been traveling that for 40 years and I've never had no problem.

Carter: This is for your information. I just wanted to let you know that we will be making application.

Allen: Thank you Mrs. Carter for your report. We've already done other Board matters. We've already done Executive Session. I'm ready to adjourn.

There being no further business to discuss, Chairman Allen adjourned the August 10, 2015 meeting.

After many work sessions and public forums the Draft Comprehensive Plan is complete. The document has been provided for your review. This document will serve as a guide to some of the changes that need to be made to our ordinances and some projects for our Capital Improvements Plan. While the State mandates that we update the Comprehensive Plan every five (5) years we can update this document as often as necessary. The Buckingham Planning Commission held a public hearing for the drafted Comprehensive Plan on July 20, 2015. The Planning Commission recommends approval of the Comprehensive Plan.

During the past month, several concerns have been brought forward by Supervisor Staton. I forwarded these concerns to the Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) and they have responded by researching and making proposed changes. These changes do not change the intent of the Plan. However, to make these changes an official part of the document we do need them referenced as part of the motion to adopt the plan. Below are pages and referenced change:







5. That all documentation submitted by the applicant in support of this special use permit request becomes a part of the conditions.


6. The pets shall be monitored and prevented from trespassing on adjacent parcels.

1-Land use- The "business" (proper and official name TBD) in reference to this special use permit application will be a small, upscale dog boarding kennel of approximately ten runs. This will be a climate-controlled, indoor kennel with temporary outdoor runs. The business will be located on approximately 2 acres of a contiguous 50 acre lot and will be physically located in Buckingham County, Virginia. The building will have a small, circular drive in the front for ease and efficiency of ingress and egress.

2-Community Design- The business will be located on private property and will not be visible from a public road. The public will have access via a private circular drive across the property.

3-Cultural Resources- The business will be reaching out to local veterinarians, shelters, animal control agencies and other commercial pet facilities. This networking will create an open working relationship with these agencies and businesses to provide better pet care and boarding for pet owners in Buckingham and the surrounding counties.







**AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING
THE FORMATION OF A JOINT ENTITY,
THE WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT AREA CONSORTIUM,**

**BETWEEN THE COUNTIES OF AMELIA, BRUNSWICK, BUCKINGHAM, CHARLOTTE, CUMBERLAND,
HALIFAX, LUNENBURG, MECKLENBURG, NOTTOWAY AND PRINCE EDWARD, VIRGINIA TO BE CALLED
AND BESTOWING ON SUCH ENTITY ALL POWERS NECESSARY AND PROPER FOR THE PERFORMANCE OF
ITS DUTIES UNDER THE WORKFORCE INNOVATION AND OPPORTUNITY ACT AND REPEALING ALL
PRIOR ORDINANCES CREATING AN ENTITY FOR SUCH PURPOSES**

WHEREAS, the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act of 2014 (Public Law 113-128, (hereinafter the "Act"), provides federal funding to states for the delivery of workforce training and other services; and

WHEREAS, the Act requires the Governor to designate local workforce development areas to deliver workforce development services within the state; and

WHEREAS, the Governor has designated the Counties of Amelia, Brunswick, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland, Halifax, Lunenburg, Mecklenburg, Nottoway and Prince Edward, Virginia (the "Member Jurisdictions") as the Area VIII Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act Area; and

WHEREAS, on July 1, 2015, the Member Jurisdictions entered into an agreement to jointly administer the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act programs called the "CLEO-LWIB Agreement" for the South Central Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act Area 8 (the Charter Agreement") and have operated continuously under this Charter Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Member Jurisdictions wish to continue to jointly perform the responsibilities prescribed for them under the Act; and

WHEREAS, VA. Code §15.2-1300 provides that local governments may enter into agreements for joint or cooperative exercise of any power, privilege or authority which each is capable of exercising individually; and

WHEREAS, the Member Jurisdictions desire to form a joint entity under Va. Code § 15.2-1300 to be designated as the South Central Workforce Development Area Consortium (the "Consortium") and to be recognized as Virginia's Area VIII Local Workforce Development Area which will perform the duties incumbent on them individually under the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act; and

WHEREAS, the creation of a joint entity will permit the delivery and oversight of workforce services in a manner that will ensure accountability to governing bodies of the Member Jurisdictions.

NOW WHEREFORE, the Board of Supervisors of _____ hereby

1. Rescinds the Charter Agreement and any other ordinance creating a local joint entity for the purpose of operating federally funded workforce training programs;
2. Approves entering into the South Central Workforce Development Consortium Agreement (the "Agreement") which is attached hereto and made a part of this Ordinance; and
3. Authorizes the Chair of the Board of Supervisors of the County of _____ to execute the Agreement on behalf of the Board of Supervisors.

This agreement is executed by the duly authorized elected officials from the Counties of Amelia, Brunswick, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland, Halifax, Lunenburg, Mecklenburg, Nottoway and Prince Edward (the "Member Jurisdictions") and shall be effective on the latter of July 1, 2015, or on the day that the last Member Jurisdiction enters into this agreement.

WHEREAS, the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act of 2014 (Public Law 113-128), hereinafter the "Act"), provides federal funding to states for the delivery of workforce training and other services; and

WHEREAS, the Act requires the Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia to designate local workforce development areas for the delivery of such services within the state; and

WHEREAS, the Act requires that the Governor approve a local workforce development area designation request from local areas that existed as such under the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 when the member jurisdictions have each made known their desire for such designation; and

WHEREAS, the Act requires that the Governor consider and approve requests for Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act funds made by a combination of local government units; and

WHEREAS, the Member Jurisdictions wish to jointly perform the responsibilities prescribed under the Act; and

WHEREAS, Va. Code §15.2-1300 provides that local governments may enter into agreements for the joint or cooperative exercise of any power, privilege or authority which each is capable of exercising individually; and

WHEREAS, the Member Jurisdictions desire to form a joint entity under Va. Code §15.2-1300 to be designated as the South Central Workforce Development Area Consortium (the "Consortium") and to be recognized as Virginia's Area VIII Local Workforce Development Area; and

WHEREAS, each Member Jurisdiction by ordinance approved the establishment of the Consortium as a joint entity empowered to exercise the responsibilities of the Chief Local Elected Officials as set forth in this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, creation of the Consortium will permit the delivery and oversight of workforce services in a manner that will ensure accountability to local elected officials of the Member Jurisdictions.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties do mutually covenant and agree as follows:

Article I – Entity

Section 1. **Formation of Consortium.** The Member Jurisdictions acting pursuant to authority granted to them under Va. Code §15.2-1300 hereby create the South Central Workforce Development Area Consortium as an entity to exercise the powers set forth in this Agreement.

Section 2. **Consortium Membership.** The Member Jurisdictions of the Consortium shall be the Counties of Amelia, Brunswick, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland, Halifax, Lunenburg, Mecklenburg, Nottoway and Prince Edward.

Section 3. **Consortium as Workforce Development Area.** Subject to the approval of the Governor of Virginia, the ten Member Jurisdictions shall also comprise the boundaries of Virginia's Area VIII Local the Workforce Development Area (the "Area") required by the Act pursuant to 29 U.S.C. § 2831(a)(1).

Article II – Consortium Board Membership

Section 1. **Consortium Board Membership.** The Member Jurisdictions shall establish a Consortium Board comprised of one Representative from each Member Jurisdiction (the "Representative"). The Consortium Board shall have in addition to the powers set forth herein all the powers, duties, and responsibilities of the Chief Local Elected Official as set forth in the Act.

Section 2. **Representative of Member Jurisdictions and Term.** The Representative to the Consortium Board shall be a member of the governing body of the Member Jurisdiction. A Member Jurisdiction may appoint the chief administrative officer to serve as an Alternate for the member of the governing body. Such Alternate shall only serve when the member of the governing body cannot attend a meeting. When the Alternate so serves, the Alternate shall have the same powers and responsibilities as those possessed by the member of the governing body including the right to vote on all matters and shall be counted when determining a quorum. No person shall serve as a Representative if such person is no longer a member of the governing body or its chief administrative officer. Each Member Jurisdiction shall determine the length of term for its Representative and be responsible for filling the vacancy of its Representative who is no longer qualified to serve.

Section 3. **Policy Making Authority.** Every Consortium Board Member shall have the authority to speak affirmatively for the Member Jurisdiction and, in conformity with this Agreement, to commit the Consortium to a course of action.

Section 4. **Removal of Representative.** Under the bylaws and governing rules of the Member Jurisdiction, the Member Jurisdiction may remove its Representative from office.

Article III – Consortium Powers (Chief Local Elected Official)

Section 1. **Powers under the Act.** The Consortium Board shall engage in all activities necessary and proper for the execution of its responsibilities that are assigned or reserved by law to the Chief Local Elected Official, including:

A. Collectively perform the functions of the chief local elected officials of the Member Jurisdictions as permitted in the Act.. For purposes of the Act, the Member Jurisdictions shall act through the Consortium Board.

B. Apply to the Governor of Virginia for Area designation.

C. Appoint the members of the Local Workforce Development Area Board as provided in Article VI of this Agreement.

D. Execute an agreement with the Local Workforce Development Area Board for the operation and functions of the Local Workforce Development Area Board set out in the Act. .

E. Continually establish the vision and priorities of the Consortium in conjunction with the Local Workforce Development Area Board.

F. Develop the region’s strategic plan as the Local Plan under the Act in partnership with the Local Workforce Development Area Board. The plan shall be submitted to the Virginia Board of Workforce Development (hereinafter, the “Workforce Board”) in the manner prescribed by the Workforce Board.

G. Provide input into and approve the budget of the Local Workforce Development Area Board and provide continuing fiscal oversight of all funds received and expended.

H. Work with the Local Workforce Development Area Board and Governor of Virginia to establish local performance measures.

I. Approve the Local Workforce Development Board’s selection and designation of one-stop operator(s), its evaluation of the performance of one-stop operator(s), and its termination of their eligibility for cause as provided in the Act. .

J. From among the Member Jurisdictions, identify annually the local government to serve as Grant Recipient of all funds received under the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act.

Section 2. **General Powers.** The Consortium Board shall engage in all things necessary or convenient to carry out the business and affairs of the entity, including, without limitation, the authority to:

A. To sue, be sued, complain and defend in its name.

B. To adopt and amend bylaws, not inconsistent with this Agreement or with the laws of the Commonwealth, for managing the business and regulating the affairs of the Consortium.

C. To purchase, receive, lease, or otherwise acquire, and own, hold, improve, use and otherwise deal with in its own name, real or personal property, or any legal or equitable interest in property, wherever located.

D. To sell, convey, mortgage, pledge, lease, exchange, and otherwise dispose of all or any part of its property.

E. To make contracts, borrow, and secure any of its obligations by mortgage or pledge of any of its property, franchises, or income; provided that no such liability or obligation to be paid beyond the current fiscal year shall be binding on any Member Jurisdiction without the specific approval of such Member Jurisdiction's governing body, and any such contract, liability or obligation undertaken that contemplates payment from funds received from any Member Jurisdiction(s) shall contain language expressly making it subject to annual appropriation of the required amount by each affected governing body.

F. To elect officers and define their duties.

G. To hire, discharge, establish the terms and conditions of employment, and pay salaries and benefits to employees who provide staffing services to the Consortium Board, the Local Workforce Development Area Board, and Youth Committee. Such benefits may include retirement and deferred compensation plans, health and life insurance, and other leave and pay benefits as the Consortium Board determines are consistent with the practices within the Member Jurisdictions. The Executive Director shall report directly to the Consortium Board.

H. To pay compensation, or to pay additional compensation, to any or all employees on account of services previously rendered to the Consortium, whether or not an agreement to pay such compensation was made before such services were rendered.

I. To obtain indemnity insurance for the Consortium, its Board, the Local Workforce Development Area Board, and the Youth Committee and any of its officers or employees for any cause of action or claim asserted against them for acts engaged in their official capacity.

J. To employ legal counsel, accountants, and other advisors as the Consortium Board deems necessary as may be permitted under the Act.

K. To have and exercise all powers necessary or convenient to affect any or all of the purposes for which the corporation is organized.

Section 3. **Consortium Board's Oversight and Control.** The Consortium Board shall perform the following functions:

- A. Oversee the local workforce development services in the Consortium Area.
- B. Oversee the youth and other programs and fund sources which may from time to time fall under the purview of the Local Workforce Development Area Board.
- C. Consult on appointments to the Local Workforce Development Area Board's Youth Committee.
- D. Assist in the development of the Local Plan and Plan modification, review and approval for the Act's programs and other programs for which the Local Workforce Development Area Board is given responsibility.
- E. Adopt a budget for the Workforce Development Area including the operating budget developed by the Local Workforce Development Area Board.
- F. To the extent feasible, align all activities in workforce development in the Area under the policy umbrella of the Consortium Board.
- G. When applicable, ensure that the workforce development policies of the Local Workforce Development Area Board become integrated into county overall policies for economic development, education and workforce investment.
- H. Any and all powers necessary and proper to carry out the Consortium's oversight and financial control of the Act's funds and programs.

Article IV – Governance

Section 1. **Consortium Board Meetings and Officers.** The Consortium Board shall meet as determined by its members. The Consortium Board shall elect from its membership a chairperson, a vice-chairperson and other officers as provided in the bylaws to serve for a term of one year or until a successor is elected and qualified. The Consortium Board shall fill any vacancies in officer positions by election for the remainder of the unexpired term. The chairperson shall appoint a board clerk. Election shall be by a majority of the members of the Consortium Board.

Section 2. **Consortium Board By-Laws.** The Consortium Board may adopt operational and procedural bylaws consistent with this Agreement, applicable federal and state laws, and rules and regulations pursuant thereto. Such bylaws shall be adopted or amended by a majority of the members of the Consortium Board.

Section 3. **Procedural Rules.** Roberts Rules of Order (revised) or other procedural rules shall govern the proceedings of the Consortium Board insofar as they do not conflict with applicable law or the bylaws duly adopted by the Consortium Board.

Section 4. **Quorum.** A simple majority of the Representatives of the Member Jurisdictions (six jurisdictions out of ten) shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5. **Voting.** Except as provided below or required by state or federal law, all votes shall be approved by a simple majority vote. An affirmative vote of at least six (6) Representatives is required to approve the following actions:

A. Issuance of long-term debt obligations (i.e., obligations with maturities exceeding one (1) year, such as lease purchase and borrowings).

B. Sale, conveyance, mortgage, pledge, lease, exchanges and otherwise disposing of all or any part of its real property.

C. Grants or other contractual obligations which require local matching funding from the Member Jurisdictions subject to the appropriation of matching funds by each Member Jurisdiction.

D. Hiring and discharging the Executive Director.

E. Designation of a Fiscal Agent.

Section 6. **Minutes.** Written minutes shall be kept on all meetings. Such minutes shall state the substance of the matters considered and all votes taken.

Article V – Operational Provisions

Section 1. **Allocation of Funds.**

A. Funds allocated under the Act shall be expended for the mutual benefit of the residents of the Member Jurisdictions without regard to place of residence or as required by applicable law, regulation or in the approved Local Plan.

B. The chief administrative officers or their designees may execute an Operational Agreement to specify the use of general funds that each Member Jurisdiction may provide for services and administration under the Act.

Section 2. **Designation of Fiscal Agent.** The Consortium Board shall select a local government to be the fiscal agent for all funds awarded by the federal government, the Commonwealth of Virginia, the local jurisdictions, or other funding sources for workforce development activities, including Title I funds provided by the Act. The Grant Recipient and the Fiscal Agent can be the same member jurisdiction.

Section 3. **Responsibility for Funds.** The Member Jurisdictions collectively and individually shall be financially responsible for the expenditure of funds.

Section 4. **Allocation of Financial Responsibility.** Disallowed costs shall be allocated to the Member Jurisdiction(s) on a pro-rata share for the services provided in their jurisdiction(s) in the prior fiscal year under the program(s) for which such costs were disallowed.

Section 5. Return of Local Funds. If Member Jurisdictions contribute funds, assets or resources to the programs of the Consortium other than funds obtained under the Act, each shall be entitled to the return of the pro rata portion of any remaining funds, assets and resources under the control of the Consortium Board in the event of the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

Section 6. Liability Insurance.

A. The Consortium Board shall provide from eligible funds liability insurance policies for itself and its affiliate entities, the Local Workforce Development Area Board and the Youth Committee and their representatives and their officers, members, employees, volunteers, and Member Jurisdictions (“the covered persons”) as it deems appropriate and shall provide legal defense of claims in accordance with the terms of the policies of insurance.

B. The liability insurance should be in such amounts as are sufficient to cover any and all claims resulting from the performance of the official duties and responsibilities of the covered person. The Consortium Board, or its authorized representatives, shall retain legal counsel to represent the covered persons to the extent deemed necessary to supplement legal counsel provided under said liability insurance policies.

C. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed to abrogate or waive any defense of governmental or sovereign immunity on behalf of the Representatives, Alternates, covered persons, boards or entities.

Article VI – Local Workforce Development Area Board

Section 1. Membership.

A. The Consortium Board shall appoint the members of the Local Workforce Development Area Board in accordance with the criteria in the Act. . The Consortium Board shall make every effort to appoint creative and visionary individuals to the Local Workforce Development Area Board. Each Member Jurisdiction shall recommend to the Consortium Board nominees for the Local Workforce Development Area Board. The Consortium Board shall coordinate and consult with the Member Jurisdictions when necessary to ensure appropriate representation of the Member Jurisdictions, the regional labor market, the adult education providers, economic development leaders and the mandatory partner programs prescribed by the Act.

B. In making appointments, the Consortium Board shall ensure that resources and programs, although regional in nature, will address the critical workforce needs, present and future, of each Member Jurisdiction.

Section 2. Membership Composition

A. The membership of the Local Workforce Development Area Board shall be determined as follows:

1. There shall be two representatives from each Member Jurisdiction who are owners of a private business or chief executive officers of private businesses, or other business executives or employers with optimum policymaking or hiring authority; who represent businesses, including small businesses, or organizations representing businesses described here that provide employment opportunities that, at a minimum, include high-quality, work-relevant training and employment in in-demand industry sectors or occupations in the local area; and who are appointed from among individuals nominated by local business organizations and business trade associations. Business representatives shall at all times comprise at least 51% of the Local Workforce Development Area Board's membership. The business representatives must represent a broad range of in-demand occupations available in the local labor market.

2. There shall be one representative from a local community college providing WIOA training services.

3. Not less than 20% of the members of the local Board must be made up of representatives of labor organizations. This includes representatives who have been nominated by local labor federations and representatives from apprenticeship programs. Community-based organizations that have demonstrated experience and expertise in addressing the employment needs of individuals with barriers to employment, including veterans, persons with disabilities, and "out of school" youth can be included in the 20% with a minimum of at least two labor organization representatives.

4. There shall be at least one representative from the Virginia Employment Commission who administers WIOA Title III activities for the local area.

5. There shall be at least one representative from a local economic and community development entity.

6. There shall be at least one representative of an eligible provider administering WIOA Title II Adult Education and Literacy activities locally.

7. There shall be at least one representative from a secondary public school's Career and Technical Education program.

8. There shall be at least one representative from the Department for Aging and Rehabilitative Services who administers WIOA Title IV activities for the local area.

9. There may be other individuals or representatives of entities as the Consortium Board may determine to be appropriate to develop a comprehensive workforce policy within the region.

B. The Chair and Vice-Chair of the Local Workforce Investment Area Board shall be from among the representatives appointed under Subsection A(1) above.

C. The Executive Director shall notify the Consortium Board at the beginning of each fiscal year of the members serving on the Local Workforce Development Board.

Section 3. **Duties under the Act.** The Local Workforce Development Area Board shall do the following:

A. Enter into an agreement with the Consortium Board clearly detailing the partnership between the two entities for the governance and oversight of activities under the Act..

B. Establish the vision and priorities of the Local Workforce Development Area in conjunction with the Consortium Board.

C. Develop the Local Plan for the Local Workforce Development Area in partnership with the Consortium Board for submission to the Virginia Board of Workforce Development..

D. Develop a budget to meet its functions and responsibilities under the Act to present to the Consortium Board for its approval.

E. Work with the Consortium Board and Governor of Virginia to reach agreement on local performance measures.

F. Designate and certify one-stop operators as described in the Act with the agreement of the Consortium Board.

G. Evaluate and oversee the performance and operations of the one-stop operators, including termination of the eligibility of such operators for cause, with the agreement of the Consortium Board.

H. On the recommendations of the Local Youth Committee, competitively procure the services of youth service providers and recommend the awarding of contract(s) to the successful providers.

I. Direct the disbursement of funds for workforce development activities pursuant to the Act. .

J. As requested, assist the Governor of Virginia in developing a statewide employment statistics system.

K. Coordinate workforce activities authorized under the Act with local economic development strategies and develop employer linkages.

L. Promote participation of private sector employers in the statewide workforce system.

M. Conduct business in an open manner and make its activities and information known to the public on a regular and continuous basis.

Section 4. **Collaboration.** In partnership with the Consortium Board, the Local Workforce Development Area Board shall perform the following functions to fulfill the requirements of the Act:

- A. Develop a five (5) year strategic plan that connects all activities in workforce development.
- B. Conduct strategic oversight to the workforce delivery system.
- C. Oversee the One Stop Delivery System.
- D. Develop and enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with workforce development system partners for the implementation and operation of the service delivery system in the local area.
- E. Certify one-stop operators and affiliate sites.
- F. Promote quality in customer services.
- G. Provide continuous accountability and evaluation through customer satisfaction surveys and other performance outcomes.
- H. “In partnership” is defined as keeping the Consortium Board informed of how these responsibilities are exercised.

Article VII – Youth Committee

Section 1. **Local Youth Committee Membership.** The Local Workforce Development Area Board shall appoint the members of the Local Youth Committee as described in the Act and notify the Consortium Board at the beginning of each fiscal year of the members so serving. The Local Youth Committee Members may include:

- A. Members of the Local Workforce Development Area Board with special interest or experience in youth policy. Members of the Local Workforce Development Area Board must serve as Chair and Vice-Chair of the Youth Committee.
- B. Representatives of youth service agencies, including juvenile justice and local law enforcement agencies.
- C. Representatives of local public housing authorities.
- D. Individuals, including former participants, and representatives of organizations, that have experience relating to youth activities, including faith-based organizations.
- E. Representatives of Job Corps, as appropriate.
- F. Representatives of K-12 education, post-secondary education and adult education.
- G. Representatives of vocational rehabilitation services.

H. Other individuals as the Local Workforce Development Area Board and the Consortium Board determine to be appropriate.

Section 2. **Duties of the Local Youth Committee.** The Local Youth Committee shall perform the duties and responsibilities described in the Act, which shall be included in the by-laws of the Local Workforce Development Area Board.

Article VIII – Conflict of Interest

Section 1. **Certain Votes Prohibited.** No individual member of the Consortium Board, the Local Workforce Development Area Board or the Youth Committee may:

A. Vote on a matter under consideration by the respective Board

1. Regarding the provision of services by such member (or by an entity that such member represents); or

2. That would provide direct financial benefit to such member or the immediate family of such member.

B. Engage in any other activity determined by the Governor to constitute a conflict of interest as specified in the State plan.

Section 2. **Virginia Conflict of Interest Act.** The provisions of the Virginia Conflict of Interest Act, Virginia Code § 2.2-3100 *et seq.* shall apply to the officers, members and employees of the Consortium, the Local Workforce Development Area Board and the Youth Committee.

Article IX – Withdrawal and Removal of Member Jurisdiction

Section 1. **Without Long Term Indebtedness.**

A. Subject to the limits in this Section 1 any Member Jurisdiction may withdraw from participation in this Agreement, provided that it has given notice of its intent to withdraw at least 120 days in advance of the effective withdrawal date. Notice of the intent to withdraw shall be given in writing and delivered to all Member Jurisdictions.

B. Once notice of the notice of withdrawal is received, each Member Jurisdiction shall provide the public with notice that the Joint Powers Agreement will be amended to reflect the removal of the Member Jurisdiction from the Joint Powers Agreement. The vote of each Member Jurisdiction may be done by resolution recorded in the Minutes of the governing body.

C. Prior to any vote on the withdrawal of a Member Jurisdiction, the Member Jurisdiction so withdrawing must provide by written agreement how its share of the financial obligations (including the annual appropriation of funds) of the Consortium for the current fiscal year will be met; such agreement shall be signed by the Chair of the Consortium and the County Administrator or Board Chair of the withdrawing jurisdiction.

- D. An affirmative vote of the majority of the Member Jurisdictions is required.

Section 2. Long Term Indebtedness. If the Consortium has incurred any outstanding indebtedness that obligates the Member Jurisdictions to payments beyond the present fiscal year, in addition to the steps in Section 1 of this Article, the following steps must be taken before a Member Jurisdiction can withdraw:

A. A written agreement must be entered into to which each Member Jurisdiction is a party setting forth how the withdrawing Member Jurisdiction's share of all existing short and long term financial obligations will be met.

B. An affirmative vote of sixty percent (60%) of the Member Jurisdictions is required for the withdrawal of the Member Jurisdiction.

C. If there are any bonds that have been issued in the name of the Consortium, the consent of the bondholders shall be obtained.

Article X – Dissolution

Section 1. Dissolution of Consortium. This Agreement may be terminated and the Consortium dissolved upon the occurrence of any of the following events:

A. The Governor's re-designation of the Area that excludes any of the Member Jurisdictions, or includes any localities that are not Member Jurisdictions.

B. The cessation of funding under the Act and approval by ordinance of each Member Jurisdiction for the dissolution of the Consortium.

C. Approval by ordinance of each Member Jurisdiction of a Consortium Agreement which supersedes or rescinds this Agreement. If the new agreement alters the boundaries of the Area, it shall not become effective prior to approval by the Governor of Virginia.

Article XI – Miscellaneous

Section 1. Effective Date of Agreement. This agreement shall be effective upon approval by ordinance by the governing bodies of all of the Member Jurisdictions and execution by the chief elected officials thereof.

Section 2. Amendments. The Member Jurisdictions may amend this Agreement by ordinance upon approval of a written amendment by the governing body of each Member Jurisdiction and execution by the chief elected officials thereof.

Section 3. Repeal of Prior Agreements. This agreement shall repeal and supersede any and all prior written or oral agreements including, but not limited to, the Charter Chief Local Elected Officials-Workforce Investment Board Agreement dated November 12, 2004, and agreements under P.L. 102-367 (the Job Training Partnership Act) and P. L. 105-220 (the Workforce Investment Act). On the effective date of this Agreement, all the duties and responsibilities of any Board or Council operating under such prior agreements shall immediately and

simultaneously cease operating and the responsibilities under the Act shall vest in the Consortium Board created in this Agreement.

Section 4. **Implementation of Agreement.** This Agreement shall be implemented to ensure that the Consortium Board, Local Workforce Development Area Board and Local Youth Committee are in place and the designation of one-stop operators is complete as soon as possible but no later than two months following the effective date.

Section 5. **Severability.** Should any part of this Agreement be invalidated or otherwise rendered null and void, the remainder of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 6. **Amendments by Operation of Law.** References to all federal and state statutes and/or regulations shall include amendments thereto.

Section 7. **Duplicate Originals.** This Agreement may be entered into by each Member Jurisdiction as an original document. The signature on each Agreement shall bind the Member Organization.

TO: Governor's Task Force for Local Government Mandate Review
FROM: VACo and VML Legislative Staff
SUBJECT: Mandate Relief Recommendations for Inclusion in Upcoming Report to the Governor
DATE: August 26, 2015

Thank you for your service on the Governor's Task Force for Local Government Mandate Review. Your work is critical to efforts to ease the burden on local taxpayers and communities, who are subject to numerous state and federal mandates. There are a multitude of mandates of concern to localities, but we recommend you consider the following high priority issues as you make recommendations to the Governor in advance of the 2016 General Assembly Session.

1. Protect Local Government Authority to Raise Revenue

Over the past several years, many proposals have been advanced to the legislature to overhaul certain local taxes or to exempt certain classes of real estate from taxation. These measures generally do not have any impact to the Commonwealth's finances, but can have a significant impact on local government revenues.

The intent of these measures varied, as some were intended to create statewide uniformity among local taxes, while some provided general tax relief, and some provided tax relief to a specified class of entities or individuals. Examples of these measures include:

Real Property Tax Exemptions. For many years, local governments have had the option to provide real estate tax exemptions for the primary residence of elderly and disabled persons, although recipients of the exemption must meet income and net worth restrictions. Following a constitutional amendment passed in 2010, localities were required to exempt primary residences owned by disabled veterans (and their spouses) from real estate taxation, and again in 2014, the Constitution was amended to extend such an exemption to the primary residence of individuals whose spouses were killed in action. These exemptions that began in 2010 and 2014 have no limitation on the beneficiary's income or net worth. Because Virginia's military presence is concentrated in Hampton Roads and Northern Virginia, these tax exemptions will impact localities in these regions more than in other parts of the State.

In addition, a new constitutional amendment to be approved by the General Assembly next year and placed on the November ballot will, at local option, exempt the primary residence of the survivors of "first responders" killed in the line of duty regardless of whether the responders worked for local

2. Eliminate the State capture of local fines and forfeitures

The 2012 General Assembly altered how fines and fees assessed by local ordinances were transferred from local courthouses to localities' coffers. In FY 2013 all fines and fees collected by local courts were deposited to the state's General Fund, and the state would then distribute the local fines and fees monthly to each locality. The state also decided to retain one-half of local fines and fees that were in excess of 50% of the total state and local collections within a city or county. The legal basis for the state's action was assumed on a line of reasoning later repudiated by the state's Inspector General and by the Attorney General. Under a quirky state-driven formula a number of localities were unfairly targeted. "Reforms" adopted in the 2015 legislative session ballooned the number of affected localities from five to 33. The money to be seized in FY 2016, estimated to be almost \$1.0 million, is not budgeted for any purpose in the Appropriation Act. The General Assembly recognizes that grabbing local fines is not a reliable funding source. See attached list of impacted localities provided by the Senate Finance Committee.

RECOMMENDATION: Eliminate the budget language authorizing the capture of local fines and forfeitures to the state treasury.

4. Reinstate the First-Day Introduction Requirement for Local Fiscal Impact Legislation

One of the consequences of Virginia's relatively short General Assembly sessions is the fast pace at which legislation makes its way through the legislature once it is introduced. This can make it difficult for stakeholders such as local governments, as well as the public at-large, to stay on top of legislation that can have serious impacts. When the legislature approves bills that increase a locality's expenditures, or reduce their revenues, localities are forced to respond by increasing taxes and fees, or by reducing services.

From 1995 through 2010, any proposed legislation that would potentially impact localities by causing a net additional expenditure or a net reduction in revenues was required to be introduced no later than the first day of the General Assembly session. This provided sufficient time for localities and affected interest groups to analyze the legislation for any fiscal impact before the bills were heard in committee. In addition, the Commission on Local Government drafts fiscal impact statements on these bills, which requires several days for localities to provide fiscal data to the commission. These fiscal impact statements are prepared so that legislators can make informed decisions when the bill is in committee. In 2010, the legislature eliminated the requirement for these bills to be filed early, along with the same requirement for bills proposing sales tax exemptions, claims against the state, and increased terms of imprisonment. Only bills affecting the Virginia Retirement System are still required to be filed early.

Under the procedures in place from 2010-2015, a bill with a local fiscal impact could be filed until the tenth day of session. During a short session, the house of introduction must have completed action on bills for crossover by the 28th day of session. This constrained timeframe leaves little time for the referral of the bill to the commission, to engage its volunteer localities for data, and to compile the responses. During short sessions, it is not uncommon for the fiscal impact statement to be completed the day before it goes to committee. In the 2013-2015 sessions, bills were introduced after the session began on significant issues, including: uranium mining, eminent domain, stormwater management, public procurement and conflicts of interest.

During the 2015 session, Speaker William Howell, sent a memo (Memo attached) to members of the Virginia House of Delegates commending legislative process improvements suggested by members and committed to incorporating several of these legislative recommendations into the policies and rules of the House, rather than the Code of Virginia. The Speaker included HB 1865 (Kilgore), which required local fiscal impact bills to be introduced no later than the first day of the session, among those good policy ideas that will be incorporated into the rules of the House of Delegates in 2016. A similar change should be considered for the rules in the Senate for the 2017 session.

RECOMMENDATION: Support changes to the rules of the House and Senate that would require proposed legislation that may have a fiscal impact on localities to be introduced no later than the first day of session.

6. Enhanced Coordination between Workforce System and K12

State and federal mandates in education policy coupled with decreasing state and federal resources have left localities and school divisions with limited time and resources to focus on some of the key training needs of local and regional employers. Localities recognize that vocational education has been hit particularly hard by past cuts and mandates, with 88.5 career technical education programs eliminated since 2008 (VASS Survey).

There is need for a statewide effort to bring together localities and the key education, business and workforce development stakeholders to explore opportunities to make systemic changes that will increase the focus on career and technical education in K12 that meets the needs of local and regional economic development efforts. Localities desire to work in partnership with the state, the community college system and the business community to evaluate and implement policy changes that will lead to increased employment opportunities for the Commonwealth's students and an increased pool of talent with the necessary training for our Commonwealth's current and prospective businesses. This statewide effort should create better coordination of funding streams, incentives and cultural changes that will lead to an increase in the number students leaving the K12 system with workforce ready credentials.

RECOMMENDATION: Support statewide effort to bring together localities and the key education, business and workforce development stakeholders to explore opportunities to make systemic changes that will increase the focus on career and technical education in K12 that meets the needs of local and regional economic development efforts.

10. Stormwater Local Assistance Funds

In 2013 the General Assembly created the Stormwater Local Assistance Fund (SLAF) grants to provide 50 percent matching funds to qualifying locality projects that reduce stormwater pollution as required by federal and state law. Over a three year period (2013-2015), the state has provided \$60 million to help fund local stormwater projects. Meanwhile newly reissued federal permits project long term costs for Virginia localities in the billions of dollars to comply. Without adequate state financial assistance local governments will be forced to make difficult funding and tax choices affecting education, police, fire and safety, and taxpayers' wallets.

RECOMMENDATION: The budget introduced this December should include sufficient appropriations to be deposited in the Stormwater Local Assistance Fund (SLAF) to help local government in the upcoming biennium with costs associated with permit requirements tied to federal Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (MS4) and EPA mandated stormwater rules.

11. SCC Jurisdiction Over Local Government Utility Operations

The Virginia constitution denies the State Corporation Commission jurisdiction over local government utility operations. Nonetheless, in the 2015 session of the General Assembly, legislation was filed to place mandates and burdens on locality-owned electric utilities. The attorney general recently advised a member of the General Assembly that the body has authority over local government electric utilities. VML and VACo disagree with the analysis and conclusions of the attorney general.

RECOMMENDATION: Accordingly, VML and VACo strongly urge the General Assembly to not attempt to place any mandates on local government utility operations.

GENERAL TERMS, CONDITIONS, AND INSTRUCTIONS *IMPORTANT - READ CAREFULLY BEFORE SUBMITTING BID*

1. SUBMISSION AND RECEIPT OF BIDS:

- a. Sealed bids shall be received until, but no later than the specified time and date of opening as designated in the invitation. Late bids shall be rejected. **Bids, to include addenda or changes to a response, shall not be accepted via a FAX machine or by Internet E-mail.**
- b. In the event that Buckingham County government offices are closed due to inclement weather and/or emergency situations at the time set aside for a pre-bid meeting and/or the published bid opening, the pre-bid meeting and/or bid opening date will default to the next open business day at the same time.
- c. All bids shall be signed on the Terms and Signature Sheet in order to be considered. Bids submitted without a signature shall be rejected. If the Bidder is a partnership or corporation, the Bidder shall show the title of the individual signing the bid, and if the individual is not an officer of the partnership or corporation, if requested, the Bidder shall submit proof that the individual has the authority to bind the partnership or corporation.
- d. **Only when specifically requested in the bid documents** shall each bid be accompanied by a bid bond with surety satisfactory to the County Attorney or a Cashier's or a Certified Check, made payable to the Treasurer, Buckingham County. If a bid contains both clerical and judgment mistakes, a bidder may withdraw his bid from consideration if the price bid would have been substantially lower than the other bids due solely to the clerical mistake, that was an unintentional arithmetic error or an unintentional omission of a quantity of work, labor or material made directly in the compilation of a bid which shall be clearly shown by objective evidence drawn from inspection of original work papers, documents and materials used in the preparation of the bid sought to be withdrawn. No bid may be withdrawn after the scheduled closing time for receipt of bids for sixty (60) calendar days, except as provided in Section 2.2-4330(A)(i), *Code of Virginia*, which states the bidder shall give notice in writing of his claim of right to withdraw his bid within two business days after the conclusion of the bid opening procedure. Any withdrawal request made to the County Administrator must be accompanied by bidder's original work papers, or such request will be rejected. 4. DENIAL OF WITHDRAWAL OF BID: (Code of Virginia 2.2-4330)

If the County denies the withdrawal of a bid, it shall notify the bidder in writing stating the reasons for its decision and award the contract to such bidder at the bid price, provided such bidder is a responsible and responsive bidder.

5. MISTAKES IN BIDS

- a. Mistakes discovered following bid opening but prior to award: If there is a significant and obvious disparity between the prices of the lowest apparent responsive bidder and other bidders, the low bidder may be contacted by the purchasing authority to confirm the bid price. This does not relieve a bidder from the responsibility for the submission of a correct bid. If the bidder then alleges a mistake in the bid and can provide clear and convincing evidence that supports the existence of a clerical error to the satisfaction of the purchasing authority, the bid may be withdrawn only after approval by the County.
- b. Mistakes discovered after award: Bids containing mistakes by bidders shall not be withdrawn after award of a contract or issuance of a purchase order.

6. PRICING:

- a. Bidder warrants by virtue of bidding that prices, terms and conditions quoted in his bid will be firm for acceptance for a period of sixty (60) days from the date of bid opening unless otherwise stated by the County or Bidder.
- b. Prices should be stated in units of quantity as specified in the bid form. In case of error in extension of prices in the bid, the unit price shall govern.
- c. When a bid is for goods and/or services to be delivered on a one time only or staggered basis, only firm pricing shall be given consideration. General terms such as "price in effect at time of delivery" shall not be considered or award.

7. PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BOND:

When requested in the bid, the County shall require the successful bidder to furnish a performance bond and labor and material payment bond with surety satisfactory to the County Attorney in the amount of the contract price at the time of or prior to execution of the contract. If bonds are requested in the bid, the successful Bidder shall pay the cost thereof; if not specified, the successful Bidder, when requested to do so, shall secure the bonds and the County shall pay the cost thereof.

8. DELIVERY POINT AND TERMS:

All items shall be delivered F.O.B. destination, and freight, delivery costs, and incidental charges shall be included in the bid price(s). Failure to do so may be cause for not making award to a Bidder. The Bidder shall assume all liability and responsibility for the delivery of merchandise in good condition to the specified delivery location(s).

9. INVOICES:

Invoices for items ordered and delivered shall be submitted by the contractor to Buckingham County Administrator's Office, P. O. Box 252, Buckingham, VA 23921. All invoices shall show the purchase order number, the name of the person placing the order, the item description, stock number, and contract price as applicable. The County's obligation to pay amounts due under the contract shall be contingent upon receipt by it of invoices in sufficient detail to permit identification of the items as described in the specifications.

10. PAYMENT TERMS:

If discounts for prompt payment are offered by the bidder, it is required that a minimum of twenty (20) days be allowed for payment. Discounts for prompt payment will not be considered in the evaluation of bids. Discounts for prompt payment will be shown on the purchase order/contract and taken if invoices are processed and payment made within the stipulated time frame. If discounts are not offered, payment shall be made thirty (30) days after receipt of an accurate invoice by the County.

11. FINANCE CHARGES:

Finance charges imposed by the vendor on any invoice shall not be paid by the County.

12. USE OF BRAND NAMES/SUBSTITUTIONS:

Unless otherwise specified in the invitation to bid, the name of a certain brand, make or manufacturer does not restrict bidders to the specific brand, make or manufacturer named; it conveys the general style, type, character, and quality desired, and any product which the County in its sole discretion determines to be the equal of that specified, considering quality, workmanship, economy of operation, and suitability for the purpose intended, shall be accepted. In requesting a proposed substitution, the bidder shall submit with the bid form the name of the manufacturer, model number, and complete specifications on the proposed substitution for evaluation by the County. The bidder shall submit, with the bid form, a detailed list of any deviations from these specifications, written or implied. The bidder assumes responsibility for all changes in the work required as a result of the proposed substitution, including any change not listed in the request, but determined by the County to be necessary at a later point of progress in the work. It shall be understood that the burden of proof for an "equal" product shall be and remain the sole responsibility of the bidder. The County's failure to object to a manufacturer shall not constitute a waiver of any of the requirements of the contract documents, and all products furnished by the listed manufacturer must conform to such requirements. The County's decision of approval or disapproval of a proposed substitution shall be final.

13. QUALITY:

All materials used for the manufacture or construction of any supplies, materials, or equipment covered by this bid shall be new. Unless otherwise specified in bid, products bid must be new, the latest model, the best quality, and the highest grade workmanship.

14. ACCEPTANCE OF MATERIAL:

The goods and/or services delivered as a result of this bid shall remain the property of the seller until a physical inspection is made, and thereafter accepted to the satisfaction of the County. In the event the goods and/or services supplied to the County are found to be defective or do not conform to specifications, the County reserves the right to cancel the order upon notice (verbal or in writing) to the seller and return goods to seller at the seller's expense.

15. COPYRIGHTS OR PATENT RIGHTS:

The bidder certifies by submission of bid that there has been no violation of copyrights or patent rights in manufacturing, producing, or selling the product or services shipped or ordered as a result of this bid. The successful bidder shall, at his own expense, defend any and all actions or suits charging such infringement, and will save Buckingham County, its officers, employees, and agents harmless from any and all liability, loss, or expense incurred by any such violation.

16. SAMPLES:

Evidence in the form of samples may be requested if brand being quoted upon is other than as specified. The County reserves the right to request that such samples be furnished at the time of bid opening. The County also reserves the right to request samples after the date of bid opening. Requested samples shall be furnished free of expense to the County and if not used in testing or destroyed, will, upon request at the time of submission of sample, be returned at the bidder's expense.

17. TAXES:

Buckingham County is exempt from payment of Federal Excise Tax and State and Local Sales and Use Tax on all tangible personal property purchased or leased by Buckingham County for its use or consumption. Tax exemption certification will be furnished upon request. Sales tax, however, is paid by Buckingham County on materials and supplies that are installed by a contractor and become a part of real property. Contractors are not exempt from paying taxes on these categories, as they are considered to be a cost of doing business and should be considered in pricing when preparing a bid.

18. LICENSES, PERMITS, AND FEES:

All bids submitted shall have included in price the cost of any business and professional licenses, permits, or fees required by Buckingham County or the Commonwealth of Virginia.

19. SIGNED BID CONSIDERED AN OFFER:

This signed bid shall be considered an offer on the part of the bidder and shall be deemed accepted upon approval by Buckingham County. In case of default by the successful bidder, or failure to deliver the goods and/or services ordered by the time specified, the County may terminate the purchase order and/or contract, and after due notice (verbal or in writing) may procure them from other sources and hold the defaulting bidder liable for any resulting additional cost.

20. QUALITY EXPECTATION STATEMENT:

The County fully expects, requires, and shall hold all Contractors, and all agents, staff, representatives, and subcontractors of the Contractor, responsible for, and accountable to, the highest quality standards of professional workmanship, products and services.

21. AWARD PHILOSOPHY:

Award will be made by the County to the lowest responsible bidder with the lowest responsive bid which is in substantial conformance with the terms, conditions, and specifications of the bid and is in conformance with the *Code of Virginia*. Buckingham County reserves the right to accept or reject any or all bids or parts of bids, to waive informalities, and to request rebids. The County also reserves the right to award the bid in a manner which the County deems will best serve its interest. Bids making exceptions to the terms and conditions included in this invitation may be considered, but preference may be given to bids with no exceptions taken. It further reserves the right to award the bid on a split order basis, lump sum, or individual item basis, or such combination as shall best serve the interest of the County, unless otherwise specified. The County may award a bid to a single contractor or to multiple contractors. It also reserves the right to increase or decrease quantities at the unit price bid.

22. FACTORS OTHER THAN PRICE IN AWARD DECISION:

The following factors in addition to price (as they apply) shall be a consideration in the award decision:

- a. The ability to provide references which may substantiate past work performance and experience in the type of work required for the contract. The lowest responsive bidder(s) may be required to furnish a contractor qualifications statement, to include references, prior to any such award. The County may contact all references furnished by bidders. The right is further reserved by the County to contact references other than, and/or in addition to, those furnished by the bidder. If, in the sole opinion of the County, a bidder is determined to be non-responsible as a result of any investigation conducted by or for the County, award will not be made to that bidder.
- b. The quality of performance/workmanship of previous contracts for goods and/or services delivered to or performed for the County.
- c. The timely completion of previous contracts for services or the timely delivery of past orders for goods.
- d. The sufficiency of financial resources and its impact on ability of the bidder to perform the contract or provide the services.
- e. The County reserves the right, at its option, to conduct on-site inspections of any bidder's facilities prior to award. The results of any such inspection will be considered by the County in determining bidder's capabilities of successfully administering the contract.
- f. The ability and availability of the bidder to provide quality and timely maintenance, service, and/or parts.
- g. The resale value, life cycle costing and value analysis of a product.
- h. The availability and capability of local and regional vendor support as it affects the quantity,

quality, and timeliness of the goods and/or services.

i. Timely delivery of goods or timely completion of services as stated by bidder.

j. Substantial compliance or noncompliance with specifications set forth in bid as determined by the County.

k. Inventory capability as it relates to a particular bid.

l. Results of product testing.

23. STATE REGISTRATION OF CONTRACTORS (IF APPLICABLE):

Attention is directed to Chapter 11, Title 54.1 of the *Code of Virginia* (Re: State registration of contractors when applicable), which requires that all bidders shall show evidence of the proper license under the provision of this chapter before such bid is considered.

24. INTERPRETATION OF BID:

If any party contemplating the submission of a bid on this invitation is in doubt as to the true meaning of any part of the bid, the County Administrator's Office should be contacted. Any change to the Invitation to Bid will be made only by written addendum mailed to prospective bidders at the addresses furnished for such purposes. The County will not be responsible for any changes except as noted through a written addendum.

25. PROPRIETARY INFORMATION:

Section 2.2-4342-F of the *Code of Virginia* states: "Trade secrets or proprietary information submitted by a bidder, offered, or contractor in connection with a procurement transaction or prequalification application submitted pursuant to subsection B of 2.2-4317 shall not be subject to the Virginia Freedom of Information Act (2.2-3700 et seq.); however, the bidder, offeror, or contractor shall (i) invoke the protections of this section prior to or upon submission of the data or other materials, (ii) identify the data or other materials to be protected, and (iii) state the reasons why protection is necessary." Bids/proposals not in compliance with section 2.2-4342F will be subject to disclosure.

26. GOVERNING LAW:

Any contract resulting from this Invitation to Bid shall be governed by the provisions hereof and by the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Any dispute arising out of this Contract shall be resolved in the Courts of the Commonwealth of Virginia, in and for Buckingham County.

27. TIE BIDS:

In the case of a tie bid, the County may give preference to goods, services, and construction produced in the County or provided by persons, firms or corporations having principal places of business in the County. If such choice is not available, preference shall then be given to goods and services produced in the Commonwealth pursuant to Section 2.2-4324 of the Code of Virginia. If no County or Commonwealth choice is available, the tie shall be decided by lot.

28. NONASSIGNMENT:

Parties to any resulting contract shall not assign the contract without written consent of the other(s). If any party attempts to make such an assignment without such consent, that party shall nevertheless remain legally responsible for all obligations under the contract.

29. AUDIT OF VENDOR RECORDS:

The County reserves the right to audit all vendor records in contracts where payments are based on contractor's records of time, salaries, materials, or actual expense.

30. NEGOTIATION:

If the bid from the lowest responsible bidder exceeds available funds, the County may negotiate with the low bidder to obtain a contract price within available funds.

31. SECTION 2.2-4311 CODE OF VIRGINIA:

Every contract for goods or services over \$10,000 shall include the following provisions:

1. During the performance of this contract, the Contractor agrees as follows:
 - a. The Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, color, sex, national origin, age, disability, or any other basis prohibited by state law relating to discrimination in employment, except where there is a bona fide occupational qualification reasonably necessary to the normal operation of the Contractor. The Contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.
 - b. The Contractor, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Contractor, will state that such Contractor is an equal opportunity employer.
 - c. Notices, advertisements and solicitations placed in accordance with federal law, rule or regulation shall be deemed sufficient for the purpose of meeting the requirements of this section.
2. The Contractor shall include the provisions of the foregoing paragraphs a, b, and c in every subcontract or purchase order of over \$10,000, so that the provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor.

32. APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS:

The continuation of the terms, conditions, and provisions of any resulting contract beyond June 30 of any year, the end of the County's fiscal year, are subject to approval and ratification by the Buckingham County Board of Supervisors and appropriation by them of the necessary money to fund said contract for each succeeding year.

33. REQUIREMENTS CONTRACTS:

- a. Whenever a bid is sought seeking a source of supply for a requirements contract for goods and/or services, the quantities or usage shown are estimates only. No guarantee or warranty is given or implied by Buckingham County as to any minimum or total amount that may or may not be purchased from any resulting contracts.
- b. The County reserves the right, at its sole option, to renew the contract for consecutive terms.
- c. The County reserves the right to award bids for requirements contracts based on the pricing of the initial term of the contract or any combination of initial and renewal terms.
- d. The County may award a bid to a single contractor or to multiple contractors.
- e. The County reserves the right not to renew the contract at the end of the initial term or any subsequent term.
- f. The County reserves the right to terminate the contract upon written notice to the contractor(s).
- g. In the event that a requirements contract is awarded for goods and/or services, the County reserves the right to bid individual bulk purchases if the County deems it will best serve their interest.
- h. It is understood and agreed to between the parties in a resulting contract that Buckingham County shall not be obligated to purchase or pay for materials under such contract unless and until they are ordered and delivered.
- i. Bids based on a firm price or those including a "downward escalator" clause for a requirements contract term may be given preference over lower ones bearing an "escalator" clause.
- j. The County has the right to extend this contract up to and not to exceed one hundred twenty (120) days following the last term of renewal.

34. SECTION 2.2-4312 CODE OF VIRGINIA - DRUG FREE WORKPLACE

During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees to:

- a. Provide a drug-free workplace for the contractor's employees
- b. Post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, sale, distribution, dispensation, possession, or

use of a controlled substance or marijuana is prohibited in the contractor's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violations of such prohibition

c. State in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor that the contractor maintains a drug-free workplace

d. Include the provisions of the foregoing clauses in every subcontract or purchase order over \$10,000, so that the provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor For the purposes of this section, "drug-free workplace" means a site for the performance of work done in connection with a specific contract awarded to a contractor in accordance with this chapter, the employees of whom are prohibited from engaging in the unlawful manufacture, sale, distribution, dispensation, possession or use of any controlled substance or marijuana during the performance of the contract.

35. ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT:

Contractor shall be responsible for complying with all applicable federal, state, and local environmental regulations, if any. For questions or additional information, contact the County Administrator's Office at 434.969.4242.

36. SECTION 2.2-4343.1 CODE OF VIRGINIA:
